CLAIMS Against S. E. Phinney Were Presented by the Creditors Tuesday. A. J. Rowley Was Elected Trustee. Could Not Agree on Grant or Seiberling. One Had Majority In Amount, Other In Number.

The contest over the appointment of a trustee, for the creditors of S. E. Phinney, was settled Tuesday afternoon by Referee D. A. Doyle, who named A. J. Rowley for the important trust. Mr. Rowley immediately filed a bond in the sum of \$20,000. He has taken possession of the property of the bankrupt and will retain it until the final settlement of the affairs. On the motion of the creditors, the shoe stock will be offered for sale, at public auction between the hours of 1 and 3 o'clock, Tuesday, April 10. It will be sold as an entirety or in three parcels. There will be a number of bidders. C. T. Grant and Francis Seiberling were candidates for the appointment. When it came to a vote it was found that Mr. Grant had the majority in the number of creditors and Mr. Seiberling in amount. This made it necessary to have another election. The creditors got together and agreed on Mr. Rowley. The second hearing of the creditors was postponed to Saturday, April 7. The only member of the Phinney family examined was the wife of the bankrupt. She holds notes against her husband to the amount of \$4027. The creditors disputed the validity of the notes. They were allowed as claims by the Referee. E. A. Phinney, a son, has notes aggregating \$4292. Claims were filed Tuesday to the amount of \$53,600.

The society voted to make President J. Park Alexander, a member of the National Conference of Charities and Correction. J. H. Seymour, general secretary, filed a report for the season. It contains the following items: Garments given out, 916; families relieved, 98; persons aided, 315; orders for groceries, 19; coal, 12 tons; garments received, 771. The society has paid out in the past five months, \$512.32, and there remains in the treasury, \$967.10. Mrs. Adamson, superintendent of the Industrial school submitted her annual report. It embraces the reports of her subordinate officers and is as follows: "Akron, O., April 3, 1900. To the officers and members of the Union Charity Association: As superintendent of the Industrial School under the direction of this association, I present the following report: "Our school opened on Saturday, Nov. 11, 1899, and continued each consecutive Saturday, including March 31, 1900, making in all 21 school days. SECRETARY'S REPORT. "The number of officers enrolled during the year, 8; number of teachers enrolled, 31; number of scholars, 284. The average attendance, 100. The number of pupils is 43 more than last year. There were nine pupils who were present every Saturday. Three were absent but one Saturday and five that were absent but two Saturdays.
