CITIZENS

Want the Advantages

That Accrue to Them From Annexation.

South Siders Not Backward About Matter.

Will Ask For a New School House, Fire Station,

Police Protection, Electric Lights and Improved Streets.

South Akron people who became residents of the city last Monday by annexation, are going to ask the Board of Education to build a school house for the benefit of their district.

They fear that with the present overcrowded conditions of the Akron schools the children of the district annexed to the city cannot be taken care of at the regular ward schools.

There will be a contest in the new district to determine upon which side of the railway tracks the new building shall be erected. The South Akron crossings are very dangerous because of the high speed at which trains are run and the Commissioners will be asked to notify the companies to operate the trains at a lower speed.

At the next meeting of the Board of Education a delegation of South Akron citizens will be on hand to find out where they are at with reference to school facilities.

It is the intention of the Coventry directors to dismiss all teachers now employed for that part of South Akron schools within the Akron district and the scholars will be turned over to the Akron board. A redistricting of the whole city by the Board may be necessary.

South Akron people are also going to demand police protection, lighting and fire service, and improved streets.

ALARMED

At Action of Chinese Minister at Washington.

Spying Out Reformers, That Families May be Punished.

Vancouver, B. C., April 27.—(Spl.)—Wa Cumyow, foreign secretary of the Chinese reform association of Canada, said today that the Chinese reformers in Canada were alarmed at the action of the Chinese minister of Washington, who is reported in mail advices just received from the Orient to be wiring Li Hung Chang the names of Chinese in America, who are in sympathy with the reform movement in order that their families in China may be seized and imprisoned. Mr. Wa calls the Chinese minister a creature of the Dowager Empress and says that he is carrying favor with his mistress. He says the minister is out of favor with Chinese reformers the world over and he thinks the American government should take action in the matter as Great Britain has done in Hong Kong in the case of Li Hung Chang's alleged kidnapping of Chinese reformers. Wa says the Canadian reform association will meet at once to consider the matter and joint action will be taken by reform societies all over the world.

GATES

Trying to Break Down a Southern Competitor.

Birmingham, Ala., April 27.—(Spl.)—President John Gates of the American Steel and Wire company has been directing part of his assault on the market of the Alabama Steel Wire and Rod company, whose two million dollar plant at Ensley has just commenced operation. The Ensley plant meets the cut of one dollar per keg on nails and one dollar per hundred on wire. G. W. Shuler, secretary of the Alabama concern asserts that Gates has had three men watching the progress of the plant at Ensley and a statement was heard that the Alabama industry would be pounded hard. Shuler says the Texas and Southwestern customers have promised preference to business and the efforts of Gates will be ward off.

STRIKE

Of New York Central Employees

May Affect 20,000 Men—Others be Called Out.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 27.—(Spl.)—If the demands of the striking car repairers and inspectors are not granted by the New York Central railroad within a reasonable length of time, every employe of that line of work, between New York and Buffalo, numbering about 20,000 in all, will be called out. This was the positive statement made by Business Agent John T. Butler early today. There is little probability of the railroad company giving in as the wages of the men were raised in March, or, rather, where 75 men got an increase, there were about 20 men's wages reduced to the figure that the others were raised. Officials say many of the men were forced into the strike. The strikers are holding a meeting today.

SYMPATHY STRIKE

May be the Result If Southern Telegraphers Lose.

Chicago, April 27.—(Spl.)—The tie-up of the big railroads centering in Chicago, as well as all the important systems east of the Mississippi river is a possible contingency in sympathy with the strike of the telegraph operators on the Southern railroad. A committee representing the Southern operators has been in Chicago conferring with prominent members of the order of Railroad Telegraphers, regarding a sympathy action, to help the Southern strikers win. Secret meetings have been held several times. The Chicago operators have been asked to contribute to the support of the striking men now out. According to reports a sympathy strike will be in order on all the important railroad systems east of the Mississippi river as the first sign of victory on the part of the managers of the Southern line.

Committee Will Organize.

A local Republican politician informs the Democrat that the Republican County Central committee will organize within a few days. CONFISCATING

Property of Free Staters Who Violate Their Oaths.

London, April 27.—(Spl.)—There is no fresh news this morning in regard to the fighting at the front. The war correspondents in reviewing the recent operations point out that while they were successful only in compelling the Boers to evacuate their positions, General Polo-Carew's march is bound to have an excellent effect. Whenever he found Free Staters who had broken their oaths of allegiance he ordered that their horses and cattle should be seized. Recently the Free Staters who profess friendship for Great Britain have been hiding their muskets on distant kopjes instead of burying them on their farms.

The latest dispatches from Lorenzo Marques say the number of Boers now in the field is estimated at 30,000. Of this number 13,000 are at Kroonstad, 6,000 in Natal and 700 at Mafeking.

Seven new French cannons have arrived at Pretoria. It is said that they were secretly landed at Kosi Bay and were sent from there to the Transvaal by way of Swaziland.

Warren Appointed Governor.

London, April 27.—(Spl.)—The War office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts:

Bloemfontein, April 27.—General Warren has been appointed military governor of Griqualand west while the country is in a disturbed condition.

TEDDY

Given a Great Ovation at Chicago.

Would Rather be Governor Than Vice President.

Chicago, April 27.—(Spl.)—In an interview published in the several Chicago papers today, Governor Roosevelt is quoted as saying that he would rather be a private citizen than vice president of the United States. Says the Governor: "I would retire to private life before I would become a candidate for the vice presidency."

"I shall be a candidate for re-election. The good people of New York believe I deserve a second term. No vice presidency. I would rather be Governor of New York any time than vice president. As a matter of fact, the office of Governor of New York is next to president."

Here is what the Governor said at the Marquette club last night: "Nothing comes from the man who asks 'reform' as if it were some concrete substance like a cake that could be handed out. 'A perfectly good man is useless to a community. 'With virtue must go gameness, but if a man have both and is a natural born fool, nothing can be done with him."

"Any man who goes into politics to be selfishly practical becomes a sort of civic wild beast. You must hunt him. Follow high ideals, keep your eyes on the stars, but don't forget your feet are on the earth."

When he was introduced a hundred voices yelled: "Our President in 1904. We want you, Teddy, yes we do." The applause and calls lasted 15 minutes.
