Charles Clemens Suffered Great Agony.

Tim Hoonan Has Match In Pittsburg.

Struck on Head by a Falling Brick.

Barberton, May 23.—Charles Clemens, 67 years of age, a boarder at the Kirkham house, is suffering from blood poisoning.

Seven weeks ago last Saturday Mr. Clemens cleaned a mess of fish. In the operation, a fin found its way into his thumb. That night his thumb and hand swelled to three times its normal size and he suffered excruciating pain. He says it felt as though the flesh was falling from his bones. In a few days the swelling extended on his arm to his elbow. The doctors wanted to amputate but he refused to listen to their advice, stating that he was too old to have such an operation performed. His arm and hand were lanced in about 20 places to have the impurities ooze out. He has recovered slowly ever since, and today he was able to be on the street.

Fearful Loss of Life In Mine Explosion.

Twenty-Three Miners Killed In North Carolina.

Greensboro, N. C., May 23.—(Spl.)—A terrific explosion occurred in the Cummock mines, 40 miles west of here at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Twenty-three miners were killed and 30 were injured.

Of the dead 11 were white, including several of the foremen and the remainder were colored. It is not known what caused the explosion.

At 6 p. m. all the bodies had been removed, and the surgeons were working over the injured, many of whom are fearfully mangled and cannot live.

C. L. & W. Appraised.

The Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling railroad has been appraised as follows per mile: Main track, \$6,500; sidings, \$1,000; rolling stock, \$9,250; moneys and credits, \$180. The only change as compared with last year is in the rolling stock, which was increased \$850 per mile, and in the moneys and credits, which were increased \$35 per mile.

They Are Still Waiting For Settlement.

The potters known as the "Jolly men" who struck a few days ago, are still out, pending a settlement of the difficulty.

Approximately 150 men are out but it is firmly believed that an adjustment of the situation will be reached within a few days.

The manufacturers are in correspondence with their competitors in other cities to ascertain the amount paid to the same class of workmen elsewhere. It is the wish of the Akron employers to pay the same scale of wages as is paid in other places.

The men have always worked on piece work and they ask an increase in the scale.
