Great Game Booked Between Barberton Council and Merchants. All Have Been Training For Event. Mayor McNamara Closed Real Estate Deal.

Fifty New Houses Will be Erected—Planting Trees. (Special Correspondence.) Barberton, Aug. 21.—The hottest ball game of the season will be played at the Stirling grounds Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock between the City Officials and Grocers. Mayor McNamara is training at the New Portage Springs, and takes a three mile run to Louie Young's twice a day. Councilmen Robertson and Whigam have been making a ten mile run daily, and catching all the wind possible, so their kicking and coaching propensities will be of great value to the officials. Sanitary Policeman Wertz and Councilman Bryan both played in fast company in the sixties, and its dollars to doughnuts they will give a good account of themselves. Water Works Trustee Edwards and Councilman Sohner are practicing sliding, and their friends say they have got the dusty business down to perfection. Clerk Witner has been practicing bunting for the last week. He is now a star. Solicitor Everhard is studying Spaulding's base ball guide, and will be able to discuss or cuss all contrary points with the umpire. Treasurer "Pop" Miller will probably be selected to do the twirling and Bill Robertson of Carrara fame will do the receiving. Officer Colton will play in center field and keep his weather eye peeled so that Frank Haas and Bill White don't seal the fence. Marshal Ferguson will guard against the small boys calling the players fictitious names. Councilman McCarty has got himself in elegant form by playing hand ball at the canning factory, and is now able to do a hundred yards in less than three hours. Hines, Dumble and Mitchell are showing up well in practice. When Scaler Harry Baughman cries play ball, one of the greatest games in history will be in progress. The Grocers are all in the pink of condition and bets are being laid in their favor. Admission to the game is 83 cents a hundred. Crime of Some Wretch

Who Made His Escape During Heavy Storm.

Innocent Child Subjected to Assault.

Found Crawling Out of Woods, Almost Dead

From Injuries That Had Been Inflicted—No Arrest.

Little Tina Maass, aged 5 years, Monday afternoon was the victim of a most revolting assault. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore H. Maass, of East ave. Her father is the proprietor of a hennery on Perkins Hill. At 5:30 o'clock the little girl was standing in the front yard feeding the chickens. The inhuman wretch who committed the horrible assault upon the child came driving along at the time in a one horse spring wagon. With him was a small boy, whose name, so far has not been learned. The fiend, who is described by the

girl, never before so far away from her parents, again began to scream. With great labor she found her way to the road and again called in her little terror-stricken voice for her parents. Mrs. Mary A. Waltz, residing in the neighborhood heard her scream and ran towards her. The child was able to tell her who she was and what had occurred. The little girl was at once taken home to her parents, and her father notified the police. Later in the evening he came down to the police headquarters, bringing with him his little daughter. Dr. Fouser examined her injuries and pronounced them serious. The police made thorough and desperate efforts to locate the fiend and the small boy, who was riding with him before the crime. All night long and Tuesday forenoon they searched, but were not successful in their efforts.
