EARNINGS OF THE FIGHTERS.

CONGER

Sent a Message. Chinese Conditions Remain Unchanged.

Cabinet Held a Called Meeting Today.

Courier Service Established to Chinese Capital.

Replies of the Powers Will be Held Several Days.

Washington, Sept. 4.—(Spl.)—Communication has again been established between Peking and Washington.

Minister Conger was heard from last night in a message dated August 30, showing that it took only four days to forward it. Officials of the State department say that a courier service has been established which will probably be kept until the telegraph line to Peking can be guarded.

Mr. Conger's message does not show any material change in conditions in the Chinese capital, but it will not be made public at least until after it is presented at the cabinet meeting today.

Acting Secretary of State Dr. Hill has taken up the duties of that department and reiterated Mr. Adco's statement made last week that the reply of the powers to the Russian proposition would not be made public until after all had been received.

These replies are regarded as the answers of the powers to a proposition made by Russia and not to the counter proposition made by the United States in answer to Russia's proposal.

STRAW RIDERS Are Too Much For Minister Wu.

Cape May, N. Y., Sept. 4.—(Spl.)—Minister Wu Ting Fang disapproves of American straw rides. The Chinese envoy was a guest at one of these functions last Saturday evening, with his nephew, Fung Choa Chee.

Four horses decked with sleigh bells and plumes pulled a hay cart half filled with straw. Minister Wu was given the place as guest of honor at the head of the load.

A dozen young damsels and their escorts made up the party. Everything went well, until by the light of a Japanese lantern, Minister Wu saw the arm of one of the young fellows steal around his girl's waist.

In China this would have been a most shocking breach of the peace, so the Minister watched the young lady to see if she would resent the action.

Instead he noticed that she found the hand of the fellow under the straw and held it. The "cooing" became more emphatic than Mr. Wu had been brought up to, so he pulled his nephew to the end of the wagon and alighted, with the remark, "we need exercise and will walk home."

He nodded to the astonished people, and politely saying good night, started in the direction of his hotel.

Minister Wu will say nothing about the affair, but remarked that the women of China do not go on straw rides.

PLAGUE Makes an Alarming Spread at Glasgow.

Glasgow, Sept. 4.—(Spl.)—The bubonic plague here probably originated last January in house adjoining that of which the first patient was taken.

At that time Mrs. Branigan died. She lived alone and her body was not discovered until a week later. It was decomposed and partly eaten by rats.

A Mrs. Edson was employed to clean the house and she became ill and was removed to the hospital where she is now suffering from enteric fever.

Mrs. Brogan, an intimate friend of Mrs. Edson and Mrs. Maloy and Mrs. Maloy's husband, died suddenly. At the wake held over the body of Mrs. Maloy, the

infection was communicated to others and the conditions are favorable to the further spread of the disease through the wandering of the infected rats. At noon today, the Medical board reports 13 doubtful cases and 103 cases under suspicion.

LIVED After 2000 Volts of Electricity Passed Through His Body.

Lynn, Mass., Sept. 4.—(Spl.)—Wm. Howe, a young man of 25 or 26 years, employed in the Central Electrical works, who received a shock of 2,000 volts of electricity while at work last Saturday afternoon, is not only alive, but has returned to work again.

A wire carrying 2,000 volts of electricity, which is used for motors, runs through the room in which Howe works. Saturday afternoon his left hand came in contact with the wire, and his right hand held a metal screw driver, completed the circuit through his body.

Bresci Confesses.

Rome, Sept. 4.—(Spl.)—Bresci, the anarchist assassin of King Humbert, has revealed to the governor of the Milan prison, the identity of the companion who was seen with him at Monza prior to the shooting of the king.

CONFERENCE Of Anti-Imperialists to be Held at Columbus.

Dr. Davis, the secretary of the Non-Partisan conference to be held at the Great Southern hotel in Columbus, Ohio, September 5th, says that much interest is being manifested in the conference and the outdoor meeting to be held on the Capitol grounds in the evening following the conference.

Mayor Jones, of Toledo, and Gen. John Benney, of Columbus, are to be the principal speakers at the meeting.

Dr. Davis further reports that he is receiving many letters from prominent Republicans of the State who are opposed to the Imperial policy of the present administration, informing him that they will be present at the Non-Partisan Anti-Imperialist conference, September 5th.

RETURNED. Chief of Police Harrison Got Home Today.

Chief of Police H. H. Harrison returned to Akron, at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning, after a 10 days' visit with relatives and old friends at Sunbury, Pa.

At noon the Chief donned his uniform and assumed formal charge of the police force.

He stated that he had rested up sufficiently to assume his duties, and from now on would be found daily at his office in police headquarters on Mill st.

Acting Chief John Durkin will resume the beat he held prior to assuming the duties of chief of police during Harrison's absence.

Inquest Postponed.

Coroner E. O. Leberman will hold the inquest over the deaths of Glen Wade and Rhoda Davidson this week. The coroner had intended to commence Wednesday, but owing to a lack of room at the Court House, it has been postponed for a few days.
