FUNSTON

Routed the Filipinos.

Rebels are Unusually Active In Luzon,

And Cause the Americans Great Anxiety.

Lieut. Morrow Defeated 300 Bolomen.

Americans Have the Best of the Engagements.

Manila, Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—Rebel Activity is reported from several points in Luzon. Gen. Funston with a troop of the Fourth cavalry, ran into a hundred Filipinos on the banks of the river Chico, near San Isidro, and routed them. The Filipinos left four dead on the field. The Americans charged across the river in brilliant fashion in order to drive the enemy from cover. Lieut. Morrow, with 50 men of the Forty-seventh infantry while returning from Bulacan, which he had attacked and fortified, encountered 300 Bolomen under Col. Victoris.

Morrow's men charged and routed the Bolomen with heavy loss.

STRAINED

Are the Relations of Portugal and Holland.

The Hague, Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—Indignations over the ousting of Herr Pott, the Dutch Consul Lorenzo Marques by Portugal. Pott was charged by the English with being a Boer agent. The Dutch minister to Portugal and the Portuguese minister to Holland have left their posts in consequence.

London, Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—The second supplementary army estimate calling for 16 million pounds additional to cover expense of the South Africa and China war has been issued.

MILNER

Seems to be in the Way of Peace.

Cape Town, Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—The Afrikaner bond, 8,000 strong, now meeting at Worcester, is conducting itself quietly, much to the surprise of the British. The bond says there can never be peace in Africa until Sir Alfred Milner leaves the Cape.

MANCHESTER

And His Ohio Bride

Were In Akron a Short Time Friday.

The Duke Did the Talking For the Party.

He Is Enjoying His American Honeymoon.

Millionaire Zimmerman Was With the Royal Couple.

Three of the most discussed people in the world today passed through Akron Friday. They are the Duke and Duchess of Manchester and the latter's father, Millionaire Ernest Zimmerman of Cincinnati.

The distinguished trio were traveling from New York to Cincinnati in "Papa" Zimmerman's private car. The coach was attached to train 13, and it was 12:30 o'clock when the train reached this city. Very few people knew of the exact time the royal party would arrive and consequently only the usual depot crowd was present to catch a glimpse of the celebrities.

The Duke of Manchester was seen for a few moments by a representative of the Democrat. He greeted the reporter cordially and while he had talked to many American reporters, the Akron brand was the first he had met in Ohio.

The Duke is a pleasant gentleman to meet. As soon as the newspaper man was announced, Manchester came to the car platform readily and shook hands with a decided grip. The Duke is rather below medium height and while he is not frail, he is not stockily built. His face is smoothly shaven and he is a mere youth in appearance. The distinguished Englishman was neatly attired in a grey striped suit with a coat of the double-breasted cut. He wore low shoes and upon his head was a jaunty little golf cap. While he is a native Britisher, the Duke speaks with seemingly a German accent, which is no doubt due to the Zimmerman alliance.

Manchester said that he was enjoying his American trip immensely notwithstanding the fact that he has visited this country many times. He said that after visiting at the Zimmerman mansion in Cincinnati, that he and the Duchess would visit the largest cities in America before returning to England.

Besides the Duke and Duchess and Mr. Zimmerman, Miss Ellis and Miss Evans, relatives of the Duchess were in the party.

OLD AGE

Caused the Death of Capt. Josiah J. Wright.

Served With Distinction During Civil War—Biography.

Captain Josiah J. Wright died at his home, 589 W. Market st. today at 12:30 o'clock, of old age and exhaustion, at the age of 79 years, two months and 18 days.

Captain Joseph J. Wright was born at Swanton, Vt., Sept. 19, 1821, and educated in the district school. During his boyhood he worked as a blacksmith's assistant and clerk in a country store, and in 1840 came to Ohio, where he worked on a farm for a time and attended the Twinsburg institute.

BAIL

Will be Furnished.

Sherman Is Not Without His Friends.

Akron Men Will be Responsible

For His Appearance When He's Wanted.

Itemized Bill For His Services Kept Under Cover.

Detective Edward B. Sherman assured a number of his friends Thursday that he would return to Akron in a few days and that when he got here there would be a number of people who would be made aware of his presence.

He was visited Thursday by William Washer, a brother of Prisonkeeper John Washer, Sheriff F. G. Kelly and W. B. Baldwin, editor of the Beacon-Journal. They spent some time with the prisoner. Sherman expects to be able to furnish a bond for \$1,000 in a few days.

It is said that a number of men in this city will make arrangements to furnish the necessary bail. While their names will not appear on the bond they will so secure those who do sign it that there will be no liability incurred except on the part of the Akron men. It has been stated that Sherman had a rich brother who would go his bail. This story finds little credence in this city with those who are familiar with the facts.

The itemized bill for the services of the detectives has not been found. Prosecutor Wanamaker says that he turned it over to the County Commissioners. Auditor Sisler claims that it never reached him. Commissioner John Moore states that he heard it read and that he supposed it was in the possession of the Auditor. From another source it was learned that the bill was in charge of one of the Commissioners who had been told to keep it locked away in his drawer. It is evident that there is a desire to keep it hid away from the public.

DEFAULTER

Brown Located Again—This Time In Texas.

Cincinnati, Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—An Enquirer special from San Antonio, Tex., says:

"Frank Brown, the defaulting cashier of the German National bank of Newport, Ky., is said to be in this city and it is expected he will soon be under arrest, as his presence is known to the officers. Brown came here from Oklahoma City, where he arrived on Saturday prior to the discovery of his defaulting by the public. Telegraphic correspondence has been going on between this city and the proper people in Newport."

Ship and Crew Lost.

Province Town, Mass., Dec. 7.—(Spl.)—Eighty days have passed since the three masted schooner Cora S. McKay was sighted. All hope for the safety of the vessel and crew of 30 men is abandoned. All but nine of the crew belong in this town. Fifteen widows and 54 orphans are left here as the result of the loss of the McKay.
