The report that William Sulzbach, who was injured in the mine disaster, had died Sunday proved to be without foundation. Sulzbach is improving, and no serious results are anticipated. He was badly injured about the head and face but is now in a fair way to recovery.

Peter Smith, whose arm was horribly crushed in the same accident, is improving.

It was first believed that amputation would be necessary but the attending surgeon now believes the member will be saved.

An action has been filed in the Supreme Court of California by the manager of the San Francisco branch of the B. F. Goodrich Company. He alleges that that corporation entered into an agreement with him whereby he was to receive 10 per cent. of all the profits arising from the sales made by him.

He alleges that the defendant company has refused to make any accounting with him for his sales. He asks that the court order the Goodrich company to file a statement showing the amount of his sales and that it be compelled to pay him his commissions. The case will be contested.
