PRINTED MATTER. Lack of It Handicaps Chamber of Commerce-- Akron Offers No Cash Bonuses.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce claim they are considerably handicapped by having no printed matter descriptive of Akron and her advantages as a manufacturing city. Nearly every week, it is said, communications are received, asking for information about Akron, and it is impossible to supply it satisfactorily in a letter. This condition is alleged to exist as the result of members neglecting their duties to the Board and failing to pay dues properly.
