Warrant Out For Arrest of Floyd Mellinger.

Another wheel was found at the same place by Officer Doerler a little later, and a warrant has been issued for the boy's arrest. He is 15 years old.

Frank Knight came from the Falls and quickly identified his wheel by removing the seat post and taking from the tubing a piece of paper on which was written: "This wheel is the property of Frank Knight, Cuyahoga Falls, O."

The other bicycle has not been identified. It has a blue frame, new toe clips and patent coaster.
