VERY SHORT SESSION.




ANOTHER TOURNAMENT.

He was a strong, well built boy in 1806 when he entered the University of North Carolina as a student in the academic department, and was soon selected by the upper classmen as a good subject upon which to vent their wrath and at the same time display their superiority. No college in the country was the scene of more bawling at that time than the North Carolina institute, and Strang bore all kinds of ill treatment without a murmur. He was so good natured and manly about it that the more cowardly of the older students refused to desist from their persecutions. One day, in desperation, Strang inquired of a friend: "How can these things be stopped? I'm getting tired of them and some time I'll lose my temper and give one of these sophomores the worst beating he ever had."

He began with baseball, and, although a little awkward at first, was the best amateur infielder in the South by the time the season opened. WON'T PAY

Interest on Claims Against City.

Solicitor Said It Would Not be Legal.

A Tilt Between Messrs. Walker and Gauthier.

Routine Business Disposed of by Council.

No interest will be paid fire apparatus manufacturers on their claims against the city, with the consent of the City Council. The City Commissioners' resolution to this effect was voted down unanimously Monday night.

Mr. Seidell said he would favor it if interest were paid on all other claims against the city. He said the Council and Board had made absolutely no headway in getting the city's finances in better condition and wanted to know why no practical plan had been presented.

A. J. Rowley, Esq., spoke in behalf of the American Fire Engine Co., claiming its bill was legal; that there had been money in the fund when the apparatus was ordered but the Commissioners had asked the company to wait, as they wanted to use the money for something else. It was a sad day for the company.

Solicitor Osborne Esgate being called upon said the Council had no right to pay interest on any claim, but it might do as it pleased so far as he was concerned.

On motion of Mr. Winum, seconded by Mr. Foster the resolution was tabled indefinitely.

An amendment to the huckster ordinance requiring that all peddlers exhibit at a showing that they have a license, was passed. Mr. Walker said it was a good thing; that the foreigners should be kept out.

Mr. Gauthier indignantly objected to this language, saying he was a foreigner but yet as good a citizen as anyone present.

Mr. Walker stated one ground of his objection that his little son had narrowly escaped injury in a huckster's wagon, and Mr. Gauthier at once moved that the curfew ordinance be so changed that it would keep children out of the street at all times. Messrs. Gauthier and Luchian voted against the measure.

An amendment to the signs and awnings ordinance so as to permit electrical devices above the street was passed. Ordinances were passed to establish the grade on Nash st.; for a local sewer

"WHAT
Are You Going to Do About It?"

Board Considers the Council Ignorant.

Charged With Blocking Plans For Relief.

Solicitor Esgate Lacking in "Backbone."

"What are you going to do about it?" President O. L. McMillen of the only inimitable Board thinks that Councilman Seidell spoke without thinking when he asked the foregoing question in Monday night's meeting.

"The Commissioners have been trying to do something to relieve the situation," said he Tuesday, "but whenever the Board has attempted anything the Council has blocked it. It is a matter of record that the Council refused to pass a resolution that the city would pay its honest debts. Thereby the Council said 'We will not pay them,' and if that body had its way the whole city machinery would have stopped. We had to have a piece of rope, this morning. We bought it, but according to the Council the city should not pay for it because the merchant should have refused to sell it."

The general feeling in the Board is that, through ignorance, the Council is standing in its own light, acting in a manner detrimental to the city—"biting off its nose to spite its face," one member said.

President McMillen severely criticized Solicitor Esgate for telling the Board one thing and the Council another—"carrying water on both shoulders," and "lacking the backbone to tell the Council the limit of its powers."
