HINSEY

Must Show Cause Why He Should Not be Expelled From the Supreme Lodge of the K. of P.

Chicago, July 11.-John A. Hinsey was ordered last night by the Supreme lodge of the Knights of Pythias to appear before that body and show cause why he should not be expelled. This follows as a direct result of the alleged irregularities which the new management of the endowment rank has found in the books under his 12 years' administration as president of the board of control.

About \$500,000 of assets are in bad condition, and the rank is almost \$500,000 behind in the payment of death claims. In the future no investments shall be made save by the written order of five out of the seven members of the board of control of the rank.

In addition to this a resolution is being considered to raise the payments of insurance about 50 per cent so that more funds will be provided to meet death claims and enough in addition to make good the losses and create a surplus in the future. If this additional burden on beneficiaries of insurance policies shall not be enough, the Supreme lodge will also consider a plan to assess all Knights of Pythias fifty cents or \$1 each for the benefit of the rank. The lower assess. ment on 500,000 members would bring in \$250,000.

with profound gratitude for the confidence in me which your action discloses. I shall not attempt to express in studied sentences what my feelings are, but I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

I should do wrong to your feelings and mine should I fail to take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation of the courteous act of Mr. Zimmerman in moving my nomination by acclamation. His generous action not only demands my thanks, but will add to the great esteem in which he is already held by the Ohio Democracy.

I am a Democrat in the broad sense, both by nature and conviction. I learned very early in life that the man who permitted his interest his sympathies to be limited by the boundaries of any single social class led but a narrow existence, and that only those whose hearts embrace all kinds and conditions of men can know the life worth living.

But this is not the time for an extended speech, and it is not necessary to preach Democracy to this congregation. The admirable platform you have adopted today is evidence of the genuineness of your Democracy, and fittingly presents the true character of our party, which, as Judge Thurman said, "is in its nature and principles a party of progress and supports all measures of reform or improvement sanctioned by justice and commended by sound practical wisdom."

I shall not at this time attempt any discussion of the platform, but shall later on have an opportunity of speaking at length on the various issues it presents.

There is one clause, however, concerning which I desire to take this, the first opportunity, to speak. It is that which refers to political corruption. The growing improper use of money in political campaigns is to my mind the most serious evil which threatens our free institutions. The policies of the Republican party and its leaders who "know their business" are largely responsible for it. A fund is raised each general election so vast

that it cannot be used legitimately, and the corruption of voters is undertaken with the knowledge and approval of those whose high official position adds additional disgrace to the transaction. This practice assails the very citadel of Democratic institutions and if not checked, will result in the complete transfer of power from the hands of the people to those of the hoodlums and bosses. As has been well said, "to bribe a voter is a crime against human liberty. It is the essence of treason, the meanest felony in the catalogue of political crimes."

As a party we declaim against political corruption; let us practice what we preach. Let us conduct the coming campaign on honest and honorable lines alone. Let us take the whole people into our confidence and make our light in the open. It is not necessary, of course, that every act of our campaign committees should be made known to the enemy, but let us do nothing which, if publicly known, would reflect upon our honor. Let not a vote be purchased, directly or indirectly. So far as I am concerned personally, I would infinitely rather be defeated than be elected by the subversion of a single Republican vote by fraud, intimidation or purchase.

As Democrats we profess to believe in the people and to be willing to abide by their unbiased decision. Let us do so, frankly, fairly, and fully, and I am confident they will not fail us, but will demonstrate, in spite of the money of trusts, in spite of the opposition of the bosses, that the most practical form of politics with the American people is that which is absolutely honest.

Secretary Myler Is Organizing a New Company.


