## Until Machine Shop Starts.

### New Rubber Company Almost Ready.

### President Hardy as a Prize Passenger.

### Inferiority Shunned by Manufacturers.

The machine shop of the People's Hard Rubber Co. will be in operation in about 10 days. In this shop tools for the rubber departments will be made. Ten men will be employed. The building to be occupied by the machine shop is nearly completed. The main building is now nearly three stories in height, and will soon be ready for roofing.

A representative of the company stated that the plant would be in operation late in November, he believed. When running to its full capacity 300 employees will be necessary.

### Many Prospectors Unable to Find Gold.

Port Townsend, Sept. 26.—(Spl.)—Indians in Nome, Alaska, are threatened with starvation. ## MURDEROUS.

### Akron Italian Attempted to Kill a Prisoner and Himself.

John Dissantre, an Italian sent to the penitentiary from Akron last spring for shooting Dominick Detello, another Italian, at the Old Forge, attempted to kill a fellow convict in the chain shop at the penitentiary Wednesday. Without warning Dissantre plunged a chainmaker's saw into the fellow's neck as the latter bent over a bucket, washing for dinner.

The injured man is John Patton, of Hamilton county, sent up for two years for assault with intent to rob. Without a word of warning Dissantre slipped up from behind and made a stab at Patton's throat. The instrument, however, failed to reach the intended spot, and entered the left side of the neck. Patton immediately dashed the latter from his face and wheeled to meet the aggressor, who at the same time made another lunge. Patton was bleeding profusely, but raised his arm to ward off the blow and received the blade on the left index finger. The instrument used was about six inches in length, handle and all, and with this protruding through his finger he ran to the guard and reported the affair.

When the official approached Dissantre the latter jumped from a window, which is in the second story, to the ground below, and there picked up a club and commenced to beat himself over the head with it. He was not injured by his jump or the self-inflicted punishment and was placed in solitary confinement.

An examination by Dr. Palmer showed that the saw had made a ragged hole in Patton's neck, about one and one-half inches in length. When it entered the finger the steel struck the bone, glanced to one side and went entirely through the flesh. The wounds are not serious unless blood poison develops.

Dissantre cannot speak English, and is being held in solitary until a thorough investigation is made of the affair. Meanwhile Patton is receiving the physician's attention.

Dissantre was known in Akron as a dangerous fellow. He had terrorized the Italians of the Old Forge for several weeks before the occurrence of the shooting which resulted in his arrest. Akron Italians alleged that he had fled from Italy because of a murderous assault upon his brother, whose wife he had insulted.
