A LITTLE REMINDER OF SOME STIRRING TIMES.

Verses Written by a Member of the Famous "Squirrel Hunters."

In 1892, when the raids of Kirby and Morgan began to menace the peace of Ohio, Governor Tod issued a call for minute men, who could be called on at a minute's notice, and who were obliged to go to Cincinnati for the defense of that city.

Thousands of farmers, merchants, and those who did not answer earlier calls, armed themselves with their long barreled squirrel rifles, or the Harper's Ferry service muskets, and responded to the call.

From their nondescript appearance they were given the name of "Squirrel Hunters." The readiness with which they responded, was the cause of the retreat of the rebel raiders, and the "Squirrel Hunters" were sent home again and discharged. The rest of the men who answered the call from Summit county, have been lost and knowledge of the personnel of the commands is accordingly inaccurate, but their ready response to the call at that time was noticed all over the country.

Akron, Middlebury, Tallmadge, and all of Summit county responded nobly. The following song, evidently written by a member of the famous organization, was found last week in a musty law book in a local office, the book having probably not been opened before, in 25 years. Who the bard was may never be known, but the production goes to show the spirit of the times.


PYTHIAN SISTERHOOD.
