THE NOVEL

Fills Important Place In Literature.

Rev. L. A. Lindemuth Speaks of "What Shall We Read?"

"What Shall We Read?—An Outlook Upon Books as a Factor in Producing Happiness," was the subject of a sermon by Rev. L. A. Lindemuth in the First Presbyterian church Sunday morning.

In the introduction to his sermon, Rev. Mr. Lindemuth set forth the enormous output of literature from the modern printing press, showing the relative products of the various civilized nations, the character of their publications and the aggregate amount of all publications including vile literature.

The speaker dwelt briefly with the building up of a home library, and then took up the modern novel. Showing the characteristics of various popular novels, and pointing out their moral teaching, he said, "From a moral or educational viewpoint these books are not to be condemned. In a measure they supplant inferior novels; they give pleasant, wholesome reading; they open up roads of life which every man cannot learn by actual experience; they supply a means of culture for which the old classics are too profound; they stimulate reading in multitudes who otherwise would not read. But herein is the danger. We are becoming intellectually intoxicated with light reading and are thereby being weakened. We read not for instruction, not to seek truth, not for personal profit, not to weigh and consider and feed our intellectual natures, but simply to catch the story and amuse ourselves for the time.

It, he made a strong plea for the careful reading and study of the Bible, closing with the words, "When in all our study, or intellectual research, we make this book the supreme book, and its truth the supreme truth, and recognize its spirit as the Divine spirit, given to control our lives, then we are on the road to happiness in all our reading. For he who has learned to love this book and delight in its reading has already cultivated the spirit that hates vile literature, loathes all that savors of obscurity and shuns all that seems vain or trivial, and has his eyes opened to all that is artistic and beautiful and wholesome in the realm of letters."

Schoendave, three disinterested free-holders of the corporation appointed August 12, 1901, for that purpose, be and the same is hereby confirmed, and that there be and hereby is levied and assessed upon all the lots and lands and parcels thereof described in said report and in said ordinance to construct, passed July 15, 1901, the several amounts as in said report set forth.

Sec. 2. AN ORDINANCE

To construct a local sewer in and along Bell street, from Wooster avenue to Bowers street.

Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Akron, Ohio: Sec. 1. That the construction of a local sewer in and along Bell street, from Wooster avenue to Bowers street, be proceeded with under a resolution to construct the same, adopted October 21, 1901, and in accordance with the plans and profile relating to the same on file in the office of the City Civil Engineer.

Sec. 2. That the cost and expense of said sewer shall be assessed upon all the lots and lands and parcels thereof abutting, and such adjacent and contiguous and parcels thereof between the points aforesaid, in proportion to the benefits which may result from said sewer to the several lots and lands and parcels thereof to be assessed in proportion to the benefits which may result to said property and limited to the special benefits conferred thereby. Said assessment shall in no case exceed \$2.00 per foot front.

Said assessment shall be payable in three (3) equal, annual installments, and bonds shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of the same. Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and legal publication. Passed Nov. 18, 1901.

A RESOLUTION.

That the cost and expense of said sewer shall be assessed upon all the lots and lands and parcels thereof abutting, and such adjacent and contiguous or other benefited lots and parcels thereof between the points aforesaid, in proportion to the benefits which may result from said sewer to the several lots and lands and parcels thereof to be assessed.
