The Rubber Market Firm

But Prices Are Not Changed.

"Felled Tree Will Not Yield Gum a Second Time."

There has been practically no change in rubber prices for the past week. The market continues firm and is strengthened by the stormy weather which prevailed throughout New England for some time. The rubber boots and shoe manufacturers are the busier because of that condition.

The Rubber Supply.

The price of rubber is not as yet seriously affected at any time by reports that the world's supply must in time be exhausted. In this connection however, the following from The India Rubber World is of much interest:

"There still appears to be enough rubber in sight for all purposes for many years to come. With better transportation facilities and better organized systems of operation, the more remote districts become gradually, in effect, less remote, and rubber now reaches New York and Liverpool from points whence it could not have been brought, 20 years ago, except at prohibitive prices even if the existence of rubber had been known. There is yet no need for any rubber manufacturer to cast about for a new occupation, lest he should suddenly find himself without rubber for carrying on his business. And we fancy that no one in trade will lose sleep over what the next generation will do for rubber."

"At the same time, the rubber is diminishing. An impressive object lesson is given in the form of a diagram illustrating the rise and decline of rubber production in Colombia and a similar diagram might be prepared for several other countries. In time, under existing conditions, one could be prepared for every rubber producing country, excepting, perhaps, the Para rubber districts. The reason is that a felled tree will not yield gum a second time.

COX

Holds Balance of Power

And Will Decide Legislative Fight.

Controls the Hamilton County Delegation.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 11.—A sensation was caused here last night by the action of the thirteen members of the Legislature from Hamilton county. The meeting was called because of the reports current during the past week of a contest between the friends of Senator Foraker and Senator Hanna over the organization of the Legislature, which meets Jan. 6. The party caucuses will be held in Columbus the preceding week for the nomination of candidates for president pro tem of the Senate, Speaker and Speaker pro tem of the House and all other officers in the Legislature.

The successor of Senator Foraker will be elected during the second week of the session and the Republican caucus for the nomination of Senator will not be held until after the Legislature convenes and is fully organized. The members of the Legislature say they have reports from both Washington and Columbus that the friends of Senator Foraker are seeking to name the officers under the Legislature and that some of them are working with a view to opposing the reelection of Senator Hanna two years hence. It is conceded that there will be no opposition whatever to the reelection of Senator Foraker next month.

The city published statements that have recently been made by both of the Ohio Senators regarding these contests and also the statement of Hon. Charles L. Kurtz, who is credited with being the head of a movement at this time for purposes of prestige in opposing Senator Hanna two years hence. Mr. Kurtz headed a fusion of Republicans and Democrats in the Legislature four years ago in opposition to Senator Hanna, and it is claimed now that he is preparing under "The Foraker banner" for another fight against Hanna two years hence. In this connection George B. Cox, the Republican leader in Hamilton county, the home of Senator Foraker, has been appealed to repeatedly by both sides, and he has refused to join either faction. It is conceded with the Hamilton county delegation solidly back of him, that he holds the balance of power.

The three Senators and ten representatives of Hamilton county tonight organized, with Senator Eckert as chairman and Representative Cook as secretary, and, after discussing the contest between the Foraker and the Hanna men for places in the Legislature, invited Mr. Cox to the meeting. He made a statement of the pending troubles, and urged the delegation to work for party harmony without regard to personal preferences. Before adjourning the delegation unanimously adopted the following order by Senator Hosca:

"Resolved, that the Hamilton county delegation to the Ohio Legislature, having thus far been benefited by the advice and counsel of Mr. George B. Cox, hereby agree to be governed by his further advice in the matter of the organization of the Senate and House of Representatives."

It is understood that Mr. Cox is opposed to the slates that are said to have been arranged, and that he will act as a mediator for harmony. Much significance is also given here to the fact that Gov. Nash was in the city today and in consultation with Republican leaders until he returned to Columbus tonight.
