Resolution to Oust Delayed a Month.

Council Urged City to Do Its Part.

And Incidentally Reference Was Made to "Clean Streets."

A resolution to take away the franchise of the N. O. T. Co. was introduced in Council Monday night, but upon motion of Mr. Martin it was decided to give the company one month of grace in which to fulfill its promises of better service.

Mayor Doyle attended the meeting, and reported the promises of better service made by Manager Currie. He said that Council acted wisely in granting the company a month in which to make good, but urged prompt and firm action in case the promises were ignored.

"I think," began Mr. Whinn, "that if the Mayor had observed the action of Council closely he would have noticed that we had reviewed and agitated relief from the same grievances of which he complained, and in this matter a great duty also develops upon the Mayor and Chief of Police. If they are strict in the enforcement of ordinances, the N. O. T. Co. will be largely assisted in fulfilling its promises."
