A WEEK OF PRAYER.

Services Were Begun Monday.

Union Meeting In Grace Reformed Church.

Last Night's Meetings Were Not Largely Attended.

The first of the Union services, which will be held in the observance of the week of prayer in this city from January 6 to 10, was conducted in the Grace Reformed church, Monday afternoon. It is the intention of the churches to observe the week of prayer as it was never observed in this city before. Union services will be held each afternoon this week in one of the down-town churches, and most of the churches will conduct evangelistic services each evening of this week.

It is hoped to arouse a deep-spiritual feeling such as was never before experienced in the city's history. Services are being conducted this afternoon in the Universalist church and the subject of the meeting is "Our Nation."

"The Vision of God in Christ" was the subject of the service in the Grace Reformed church Monday afternoon. Short addresses were given by several ministers. The main theme was the use of God's spirit in the propagation of the feeling of worship. The attendance was good for the first day. Those who gave short talks were: Rev. J. G. Slayter, of the First Church of Christ; Rev. C. L. Alspach, of Grace Reformed; Rev. J. C. Smith, of Grace M. E.; Rev. W. F. Wykoff, of Woodland M. E.; Rev. Howard MacAyeal, of the First Congregational, and Dr. Samuel Findley.

Evening services were held in several of the down-town churches. The services at the Grace Reformed were held in the Sunday school rooms, and were led by Rev. C. L. Alspach. Implicit trust in God was the leading thought of this talk. There was a good attendance at this meeting.

Rev. E. G. Mason talked to a small audience in the Y. P. C. U. rooms at the Universalist church. He showed how small were the labors of the scientist when he attempted to approach the works of the Infinite, how flat the finest work of art when compared with the work of nature.

The Sunday school rooms were filled at the meeting in the First Congregational church. Rev. Howard MacAyeal was the speaker. "The Holy Spirit in the Churches" was his theme. He showed the infinite love of God as revealed by the sacrifices of Christ.

"Jesus ought to be the one word on our lips and the one thought in our hearts," said Rev. MacAyeal. "His passion melts the human heart, and brings respect whenever mentioned. Let there be an awakening. Do not be over-anxious, nor too hasty, but be ready for service when the Lord calls."
