Have Cost Many Millions.

(Special Correspondence.) Columbus, O., Feb. 15.—Some friends of canal abandonment have prepared a statement showing that \$27,417,551 has been expended by the State of Ohio in the construction and maintenance of canals up to 1901. Of this sum \$15,197,000 was expended for their original construction and the balance, \$11,447,551, has been the cost of their operation and maintenance. As against this sum, the total receipts from the canals have been \$10,671,229, so that the State has invested \$10,743,322 more than it has received back. The receipts of the Ohio canal from 1827 to 1901 were in the aggregate \$9,000,000, while its cost of operation and maintenance was \$5,500,000. The receipts from the Miami and Erie for the same time were \$6,800,000, and the expenditures \$5,300,000; receipts from the Hocking canal, \$288,000, and expenditures, \$407,000; receipts from the Wallingford canal, \$55,000 and expenditures \$68,000. RUBBER NEWS

Theron Palmer Secures Patent, On a New Billiard Table Cushion.

The Price of Rubber is Remarkably Low.

Mr. Theron R. Palmer, formerly with the Goodrich Co., now superintendent of the Pennsylvania Rubber Co., at Erie, has been granted a patent on a new style of billiard table cushion. Mr. Palmer is said to have a good article. It may not be generally known that great quantities of billiard table cushions are made in Akron. This has been true for many years. Indeed it was the main foundation of these articles which put the Goodrich Co. on its feet when it was a small concern.

Col. Geo. T. Perkins returned Friday from New York, where he attended the annual meeting of the American Hard Rubber Co. The directors and officers of the company were re-elected. Col. Perkins said Saturday that nothing was done which would in any way affect the Akron factory of the company. The rubber market is dull and quotations are low, almost beyond precedent.

The price for fine Para now obtaining is 74 cents per pound. The buying is largely by speculators who hope to take advantage of the depressed prices. The New York banks which own the stock of the defunct Crude Rubber Co., are selling them out, and Africans are so low it is almost impossible to sell new stocks. Today's cables report the English market dead. Cables from Para and Manaus say that at Para there are 450 tons in first hands and estimated receipts at Manaus for this month are 2000 tons.
