HAMAN AND MORDECAI.

The Boston correspondent of the Springfield Republican has the following breezy comment upon the attempt to force General Miles to retire from his post as nominal head of the army:

There is something pathetically droll in the unavailing efforts of two administrations, assisted by Mr. Nelson and other Washington correspondents, to get Gen. Miles out of his position of Mordecai, sitting in the king's gate, and exciting the wrath of Haman. For Haman was of the imperialist party in Persia, even of the royal cabinet—a sort of Root or Corbin; and on a celebrated occasion he called his friends together, and the correspondents of the Persopolis Herald and the Eebatana Inter-Ocean, and said unto them what the book of Esther records as to "the glory of his riches and all the things wherein the king had promoted, and how he had advanced him above the princes and servants of the king; yet all this availeth me nothing, so long as I see Mordecai the Jew sitting in the king's gate." Then said the correspondent of the Persopolis Herald and several other newspapers: "Let a gallows be made of 50 cubits high, and tomorrow speak thou unto the king that Mordecai may be hanged thereon; then go thou in merrily with the king to the banquet." And the king and Haman and the aforesaid correspondent sat down to drink; but the city of Shushan was perplexed. And certain of the princes of the land came unto the king and said unto him: "If thou hastest Mordecai at all, let it be on a gallows only 10 cubits high, and in the jail yard, for we fear the people, that if they see him over the wall, wavering in the wind on the gallows, they will refuse to pay us the tribute which enricheth the princes of the land—all of them, even from Petriocomes, who dealth in oils, and Petriopitex, who dealth in stock-

waterings, and Carnidotator, who giveth libraries and universities to the hol poloi, down to little Johannes Smith, who gets a tariff of 300 per cent on the shoddy that he weaveth in his one-horse factory of the Done-fudgin river." And the king mused; and while he mused, the fire burned; but the gallows was reduced from 50 cubits to 10, and Mordecai, at last accounts, was still sitting in the king's gate; and they were circulating reports through the correspondents that he wanted to be the next king of the Cannibal Islands.

MURDERER KNEW HICKOX.

Coroner's Inquest Has Developed This Fact.

Garrettsville, O., March 31.—The autopsy on the body of Chauncey Hickox, who was murdered in his sugar camp last Thursday afternoon, was held by the Coroner, Dr. George J. Waggoner, assisted by Drs. Tidball, French and Manley. No official report has yet been made, but it is understood that Hickox was killed by a 32-calibre bullet, which entered his head in back at about the level of the ears and ranged upward, lodging in the left temple. It is probable that he was bending over engaged in cleaning out a sap bucket when he was shot. Near where the body was hidden was found the deceased's hat and keys, which his assailant had neglected to hide. Marks in the soft ground showed that the body had been dragged about ten feet from where the crime was committed.

SCORED

Miles For His Offer.

Roosevelt Called Plan Spectacular.

Papers in the Case Sent to Congress.

Washington, March 31.—"Spectacular and sensational," were the terms applied by President Roosevelt to the plan submitted by Lieut. Gen. Miles, the first of this month, which he believes would bring about a speedy cessation of all hostilities in the Philippines. Gen. Miles responded hotly to this charge saying that he could not see how the plans could be called either "spectacular or sensational." In response to the request of the House of Representatives all papers and correspondence relating to this affair were sent to the House today.

Gen. Miles' plan, briefly outlined, is to make a tour of the islands, taking with him 10 men chosen by himself from Cuba and Porto Rico, who have the confidence of the natives and who have been found useful in promoting friendly feeling between the people of the island and the United States government, who would explain to the Filipinos the benefit which will accrue to them from friendly relations with the United States. He also desired authorization to bring such representative Filipinos as he should see fit to the Capitol at Washington, that they might see for themselves the advantages of civilization and realize what the disposition of our government is toward them. Gen. Miles says that he has tried this method with American Indians with the best of results.

Besides believing it to be sensational the President objects to Gen. Miles' plan on the score that it would supersede, in powers now exercised by them, some of the best men in the service and the President also believes such measures unnecessary as the progress made by this government in the pacification of the islands is much more rapid than "we have had any right to anticipate."
