MEN CAN LIVE

With Mother-in-Law, But Women Cannot. Says the Judge.

Louisville, Ky., April 21.—The influence of the mother-in-law on the happiness of young married people was discussed in interesting style here by Judge Miller, when he granted Dalay Pearl Holstner a divorce from J. M. Holstner on the counterclaim of cruelty. He had sued on grounds of abandonment. She alleged that her husband had forced her to live with his mother, where she had been compelled to perform drudgery. Judge Miller wrote as follows:

"Within reasonable bounds the husband has the right to fix the family residence, and it is the wife's duty to accompany him. Under ordinary circumstances, however, he should not require her to live with her mother-in-law over the wife's objection. Wherever it is possible young married people should set up for themselves. The records of this court show that while men can usually live amicably with their mother-in-laws, women can seldom do so."

On this tour I will be accompanied by my wife and six-year-old son, and by Misses Daisy Ludwig and Augusta Bender, also of this city. We expect to maintain ourselves by free will offerings from the public."

Mr. Beck is very much in earnest, and says that his plan for holding tent meetings here is endorsed by a large number of local ministers—in fact, by all to whom he has explained the plan. "My ordination," said Mr. Beck, "will be under the rules of the Gospel church."

Years in Prison For a Child.

Parents Responsible For Crime He Committed.

Toledo, O., April 21.—Little Dannie Rosenbecker, aged 11 years, who killed his 7-year-old companion, Arthur Shanteau, three weeks ago, has been sentenced to twenty years in the Ohio penitentiary, the extreme penalty for manslaughter.

"WATER CURE"

Described by Man Who Saw It.

Other Punishments Inflicted Upon the Filipinos.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 21.—Jesse Conway, a newspaper man of this city, who recently returned from three years as a soldier in the Philippines, is well versed in the famous "water cure," which cuts such a figure in disciplining recalcitrant Filipinos, as he has seen it administered. Says Conway: "Place a man on his back and press on the gullet until all the air is out of his lungs, and then pour about a pint and a half of water in his mouth just as he is allowed to breathe and you have the water cure. The first application is generally sufficient to attain the desired result."

Conway says that quite a little water flows into the lungs, and generally when a native has been subjected to the water cure he does not recover very quickly.

If the dose was immediately repeated the victim would be strangled, and a person with weak lungs might be killed thereby. Conway also talks of other methods of punishment in the new American possessions. One captain under whom Conway served tried the standing-up process on the natives with good results.

If a native was captured on information from the Secret Service, and was under suspicion of having a rifle, he would either have to give it up or stand in the guard-house until he surrendered his coveted treasure. If after two or three days he did not show signs of weakening, then he would be treated as other prisoners, forced to work, and eating good rations, but detained as a prisoner until his gun was surrendered by his family or friends, or some friend brought in some other rifle to exchange for the prisoner.

A milder form of punishment was to tie the hands of the native together until he gave up the desired information, and he had also heard of natives being strung up by the neck until it was thought he was about to die, and then let down to breathe a little, when he would possibly talk to avoid a second stretching.

Solitary confinement also proved effective. Conway relates one instance at Dasmariñas, Cavite province, where an insurgent officer, known as Antone, was caught in the full uniform of a lieutenant in the Filipino army, and he was kept without food until he was ready to talk. Three days later he surrendered, and he walked about town, pointing out 69 of his soldiers, and surrendering 100 rifles.
