DESERTER

Probably Shot General Lawton.

British Official Speaks of Philippine Situation.

Washington, July 29.—The theory that General Lawton met his death at the hands of an American deserter finds a supporter in Captain Henry Harford, British consul at Manila, who is returning to England on leave of absence. He is stopping at the New Willard.

"The Filipinos are very poor shots," he said, "but with them were a good many white men, deserters, low down fellows, who offered their services to Aguinaldo."

"Many of these were good marksmen, and I think it not unlikely that he was shot from one of them laid poor Lawton low."

He said he did not wish to be understood in any way as assuming to criticize the action relating to General Smith's retirement. General Smith, he thought, had had a difficult task in Samar, and he had done well.

"It is hard for you people over here," he said, "to understand and realize the difficulties to be coped with in the Philippines. A temporizing policy, especially in such parts as Samar, would be a mistake. They must be subjugated. You must teach the little devils to respect you. I think your officers have conducted the war as humanely and gallantly as any people in the world could have done."
