HALT! Board Comes Back With Figures.

Claims That Bridge Is Held Up Not by Majority, But a Few "Kickers."

Mr. Seybold Handles the Question Without Gloves.

"Some of the principal kickers holding up the construction of the Falor st. bridge are among those whose assessments are so small that the expense would scarcely be noticed," said City Commissioner Seybold, Tuesday.

"The action of these few is unfair to the rest. They do not represent the majority of the taxpayers in the district, but seek selfishly to carry out their wishes to the detriment of a body much larger than themselves. The rubber industries and one or two other corporations and several of the larger property owners pay the half, at least, of the total expense of the bridge."

"To say the least, the action of the people who are trying to hold up this improvement against the wishes of the majority is very strange. The city officials have waited nearly five years to give the people time to make up their minds as to what they want. The majority has decided for a bridge, but the minority, by means of an injunction, denies them the improvement. This is not right."

"And the kickers have been very unfair, too. Some of them have gone among classes of the taxpayers to be assessed, and misrepresented the situation. The total assessment is to be paid in five years. For instance, the total assessment of one man is \$30. He would be obliged to pay \$6 a year. But kickers have gone to this man, and told him that his assessment of \$30 means that he must pay \$30 a year for five years. This is not only a willful misrepresentation of facts, but a contemptible imposition upon those less thoroughly acquainted with the situation."

"The threat to oust the Board will not be allowed to operate as a club over the heads of the City Commissioners in this matter. No notice has yet been served on the Board that it is enjoined from going ahead with this work. Until this notice is served on us, we will go right ahead. If we didn't we would jeopardize our bonds. We are under bond to carry out the legislation of Council. That body resolved and ordained that we construct the bridge. No notice has been served on us that we are enjoined from doing so, and our oaths of office compel us to go ahead until such notice is served."

"It remains yet to be determined whether the City Commissioners are an unconstitutional body. If they are, the fact would not change the situation relative to this bridge. The Council would continue under the old law existing before the Commissioner law was enacted. Council has passed legislation for the construction of this bridge and if the Board were ousted, the work would be done under the direction of Council."

"There are over 1,400 taxpayers in the district to be assessed for the construction of the bridge. The annual assessment for many of them will not exceed \$1. Some will pay amounts annually as small as 10 cents. The average amount to be paid annually by each individual will be a small matter."

"The people in this district should realize that the bridge will enhance the value of property. Are they unwilling under this circumstance to pay their assessments? The people in this district, who are denouncing an alleged extravagance on the part of the city officials, show a remarkable inconsistency. They have already cost the city about \$1,000 for fruitless legislation, on account of their kicking. What excuse have they to make to the public for their squandering \$1,000 of the people's money?"
