UPHOLDS

Watterson's Attack on 400.

Prominent Preacher Agrees With Him

And Likens Conditions to Those of Ancient Rome.

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 23.—Henry Watterson's recent scoring of the New York 400 is warmly commended by Dr. Judson Tittsworth, pastor of Plymouth church.

Dr. Tittsworth likens Mr. Watterson to the satirists of ancient Rome, who, with their sharp wit, "flayed a morally decadent aristocracy." He says: "Every thoughtful man has two reasons for believing that Henry Watterson's severe impeachment of the self-constituted inner circle of society in New York is just.

"First, the definiteness and the amount of information supplied by the press on the subject; and second, the tendency of wealth to cause moral deterioration so abundantly illustrated in the history of humanity. "Gibbon, in his 'Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire,' makes it plain enough that Rome's malady was, luxury, the infection of too much wealth. The decay of the most patrician families was the symptom of Rome's disease."

BABY'S BODY

For Four Years In Charge of an Undertaker Has Caused Trouble.

Owensboro, Ky., Sept. 23.—The Owensboro Undertakers' Association has a strange case to deal with. A little child of A. M. White, a veterinary surgeon, who lived here, died in the spring of 1898, and it was sent to Robert Tenny, an undertaker, to be prepared for burial. When it was embalmed the parents had no money to pay the undertaker, who refused to give it up.

The body remained in Tenny's establishment until a few weeks ago, when it passed to the Owensboro Undertakers' Association, which bought Tenny out. The present proprietors desire to get rid of the body, but there is no one to take it.

At the time Tenny refused to give the body to its parents, a Louisville paper published an account of it, which resulted in a damage suit, and a judgment for Tenny for \$5,000. The parents of the child are no longer here, and the Owensboro Undertakers' Association has a baby on hand that has been dead for more than four years.


Presented by Firemen to Mr. J. G. Dietz.

"Devil's Island" Drew Well at the Grand.

"Devil's Island," a melodrama founded on the Dreyfus case, the degradation and imprisonment of the soldier on the lonely island, was given at the Grand Monday afternoon and evening. The dramatist has Capt. De La Tour, as the Dreyfus of the play, come to his own in the last act. History is forgotten in parts of the play, but it pleases the audience. Despite the fact that the writer has gone across the seas for his story, the correspondent of an American newspaper is the man who plans an expedition for the release of Capt. De La Tour. Mortimer Snow was good as Capt. De La Tour. Harry J. Maxwell as Geo. Maxwell, the newspaper correspondent, was strong in his part. Marcus McClellan played the part of Lieut. Duvernay in a capable manner.

Miss Adelaide Warren made a great hit with the audience in the role of Countess Nina Metrovsky, the Russian spy. She was especially clever. The play has fine scenic effects. It will be repeated this evening and Wednesday matinee and evening. Near the close of the second act, three pictures are shown. The first is a picture of the French President and captain. The second is one of King Edward and bears the English colors. The third is a picture of a

group of Presidents with McKinley in the center. There was an unbroken silence when the first two pictures were shown but the third picture with the stars and stripes elicited vociferous cheering.

Artist Died In Poverty

A Sad Story Revealed by His Demise.

New York, Sept. 23.—John Charles Collins, the artist, who painted "Look Out," is dead, from accidental gas poisoning and his demise reveals a sad story of extreme poverty. Collins rose to "the stars through difficulties." Financial remuneration for his work, however, was not always forthcoming, and what he did obtain went to the support of his consumptive son who died not long ago, in the Catskills. In his later years he was forced to paint political banners to obtain money for the necessities of life. The following letter addressed to his son, but not sent, was found among his effects: "I'll soon be up to see you, Jack. It's hard scratching. I even have to daub political banners, and don't dare let a bit of such work go, as it brings in something. Jack, my clothes are getting so I look like a tramp, and I want to get a new suit before I see you. But I'll be there very shortly, Jack. Cheer up."

Collins died a creditor of the city of New York. Eleven decorative panels, painted by him and set in the Columbia triumphal arches in this city, were never paid for.
