### Of "False Prophets," Says Speaker Henderson.

The names and aliases of the companies made a formidable list. As an added source of profit some of the agencies besides their lists of heirs and heiresses, Appollos and Venuses, are said to have carried side lines of patent medicines, oil stocks and racing tips.

## BISHOP

### Gave the Preachers Advice.

#### They Should Always Attend Prayermeeting.

#### Interesting Session of Evangelical Conference.

The next annual conference of the United Evangelical church, which is now in session here, will be held at Calla, Sept. 16, 1903. There was no contest for the honor. The place was chosen Thursday morning. Rev. S. E. Rife will be presiding elder of the Western district of the conference and Rev. W. W. Sherrick will have the same office in the Eastern district. Akron is a short distance east of the boundary line between the two districts.

Devotional services were held Thursday morning from 8 to 9 o'clock. The morning session of the conference began at 9 o'clock with Bishop Dubs in the chair. He read a scripture lesson and commented briefly on the vital union between Christ and his people. Routine business was then taken up and committees were appointed. The committees will report at the afternoon session which began at 3 o'clock.

Dr. J. E. Turner, of Fountain Park, O., president of the American Bible University, was introduced to the conference.

Additional ministers and delegates registering at the conference are: Rev. W. E. Bailey, Columbus; Rev. B. S. Hughes, Siam; Rev. J. A. Johnston, East Liberty; Jos. Cunningham and A. J. Foreman, Lancaster; M. B. Templin, Cella; Levi Beaver and H. Blake Masters, Delightful.

Despite the disagreeable weather, the opening of the conference of the United Evangelical church in the First United Evangelical church, Wednesday afternoon, was well attended. Bishop Dubs had charge of the services and delivered a scholarly address. Near the close of his address he commented upon the non-attendance of members at prayer meetings. He said: "It is to be deplored that so many members of the church neglect prayer meeting. Now I want to ask you a question. Have any of you ministers 'churched' any of your members for failure to attend this service? If so, raise your hands. I see no hands. Are we not lacking? Do your families attend? Do you preachers go regularly? Do you ask you to answer this question here."

"The matter of visits by the postor is much misunderstood. Some people think that a minister's visit must last half a day and that he must feast with them. That is wrong. If you visit 15 minutes spiritually, it is well."

At the close of the Bishop's address, Rev. L. M. Boyer, of Johnsville, was chosen secretary of the conference, which then went into executive session.

Bishop Dubs delivered the sermon Wednesday evening. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered at the close of the sermon. In the course of his remarks the Bishop gave special attention to the man who belongs to no church but flits back and forth between several churches.

"There are thousands outside the church," he said, "who sing and take part in the meetings, but who will not join the church. We should not place them on the same footing as members of the church. I will not recognize every Tom, Dick and Harry as a Christian brother. It is a privilege to join a Christian church and I think little of the people who sit on the fence. People outside the church have no right to come to the sacrament. Members of other denominations are heartily welcomed, but outsiders, who will not join the church, have no right to partake of the supper. We can extend the invitation too far."

## ANTI-QUAY

### FOLKS ARE BUSY

#### They Hope to Prevent the Re-Election of Penrose.

Philadelphia, Sept. 25.—An anti-Quay faction, comprising leaders in the Union party, the Wannamaker faction and the disgruntled Republican machine in Allegheny county, are working in nearly every Legislative and Senatorial district in the State with the intention of defeating Quay candidates for the Legislature wherever possible with the purpose of preventing Senator Penrose's re-election.

Senator Quay left Philadelphia for his Beaver home late last night. He will not be here when Pennypacker's campaign in this city will be formally launched. The Senator has not been at State headquarters in Locust st. since last Saturday. Governor Stone was here yesterday, not in connection with the strike, but for the purpose, it is said, of getting inside information on the political situation. There is a remote chance that he will be asked to make a few speeches answering the charges of Democratic candidates that his administration has not been all that the public desired.

Yesterday the first of the big reform meetings was held. Judge Pennypacker and others addressed the Workmen's Protective Tariff League in Textile hall. Following the meeting a banquet was tendered the candidate.

## PIQUED

### And on the Verge of Poverty

#### A Young Man Blew Up Hotel

#### Then Ended His Life With a Pistol.

Washington, Sept. 25.—Frank J. McKee, 26 years old, formerly of Philadelphia, but for the past four years, residing at the Golden Eagle hotel, D. st. and New Jersey ave., here wrecked that hostelry with dynamite at 4:30 this morning and afterward killed himself with a pistol. Pique at being cut socially by Louis Brandt, the proprietor of the Golden Eagle is judged to have been the cause of the deed. McKee is said to have had from \$20,000 to \$30,000 during the time he had lived at the hotel, but drew his last \$70 from a Building association last week. He had been drinking heavily for some time and had lost large sums on the races. Those who know the man said he was very fond of Brandt's daughter, who returned from Germany with her mother and sister yesterday.

The explosion, which wrecked the hotel threw Brandt and his wife into the cellar. They were not seriously injured.

The dynamite was placed in a vacant room over the chamber of the couple and shattered the building.

McKee shot himself in his own room after the explosion. The other occupants of the hotel miraculously escaped injury.

## GUERIN'S BILL

#### Jury Commission Bill is a Law.
