He Has No Hands But He Is a Busy, Optimistic Man.

(Special Correspondence.) Barborton, Nov. 15.—"Handicapped? Well, slightly, but there are a few things that I can do just the same as you with your two good arms and hands."

The speaker was popular Harry Baughman, day watchman at the Pittsburg Gas Valve Fittings Co. plant. It was late Friday afternoon and the workmen were going home. Somewhat red in the face from the work which he had just done, Mr. Baughman greeted a Democrat reporter with a smile, but he did not extend his hand for he has none. He had just completed pumping several buckets of water and placing them in the shop. About six feet tall and weighing 241 pounds, which weight is well distributed, he appeared to be a perfect picture of health and happiness.

Nine years ago last July he was ramming a cannon at Canton, preparatory to firing a salute. The man at the touchhole removed his finger. The cannon was prematurely discharged and both of Mr. Baughman's hands were shot off. Amputation was necessary. The left arm was severed at the wrist and the other about four inches below the elbow. Then to the amazement of the reporter, he filled a pipe with tobacco, using a spike as a stamper, spat on the end of one of his arms, picked up a match and by the use of both "stumps" lighted it, then lit his pipe. "A good pipe beats a cigar any day, doesn't it?" he said.

New York, Nov. 15.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of the trade today says:

Lower prices for railway stocks than at any time since last March does not necessarily indicate loss of traffic nor a setback to the business. On the contrary, coincident with the collapse of the stock market, there were numerous evidences that manufacturing and transporting interests have not sufficient facilities to meet demands, although plants and equipment are of greater efficiency than at any previous time. Merchandise is fully maintained, preparations being made for a heavy holiday trade. Frequent complaints of tardy deliveries testify to the heavy consumption. Prospects for continued activity are bright because of unprecedented harvests, prosperity in the agricultural section assuring a good demand for other products. Threatened labor controversies have been averted, in some cases, wages being advanced, while a number of increases were voluntarily given.
