GREAT Day For the Maccabees.

Big Class of Sir Knights Created.

Union Review of Hives of L. O. T. M.

Tuesday was a great day and Tuesday night was a great night for the Knights of the Maccabees of the district and the Ladies of the Maccabees of the city. The Knights initiated, at a session in K. O. T. M. hall, at which there were hundreds of members present, representing every one of the 30 camps of the district, 150 candidates, in the assembling of whom members of the local tents had been busily engaged for more than a month. The ritualistic work was done by a team composed of representatives of tents in Akron, Barberton and Cuyahoga Falls, and was watched with interest by the assembled Sir Knights, who had already been through the mill themselves, and knew what was to be expected of the candidates. Dr. L. E. Sisler, Supreme finance keeper, was there, smiling and jovial; Great Commander Parker and Supreme Medical Examiner Goss were also interested spectators, and the evening was, taken all in all, one of the biggest for the Knights that there has ever been in Akron. The K. O. T. M. band gave a concert in the street before the hall, preceding the initiation, and also played in the hall upstairs after the work had been done. Unity Division, Uniform Rank, K. O. T. M. drilled on Main st., during the evening, and performed with great skill and precision, evolutions under the direction of Captain Rawlings. Lunch was served at the conclusion of the review, and the occasion was made a reunion for the out of town Sir Knights and the members of the local tents.

In K. O. T. M. hall in the Abbey block, there was a union review of the hives of the L. O. T. M. The hall was crowded and the affair was one of the most successful ever held in Akron. Mrs. Emma S. Olds was present, and at the conclusion of the review there was a substantial and appetizing spread, on improvised tables in the hall. Addresses by Mrs. Olds and others concluded the formal part of the evening's work, and the remainder of the time was spent in informal sociability.
