APPLES BY THE THOUSANDS OF BUSHELS

Farmer Living Near Doylestown Has a Mammoth Orchard.

Few people have any idea of the work required to harvest the apple crop from a large orchard, but W. S. Galehouse does not belong to that class, says the Doylestown Journal. He has just finished the work incident to harvesting the crop from the Galehouse orchard and the figures resulting will be of interest to our readers.

The orchard is located about a mile south of Doylestown and consists of 30 acres, with 785 trees. During the season just closed the crop amounted to 2,500 bushels. Of these 125 barrels have been placed in storage and will be held for the spring market. The remainder were all sold in this vicinity, the bulk being loaded at the orchard for customers from Akron, Barberton and the surrounding country, thus greatly lessening the amount of labor and expense in connection, and swelling the profit greatly above what it would have been had it been necessary to ship the crop.

The orchard is not at its best. For a number of years past it has brought forth much fruit and the crop has never failed. On some occasions 150 trees or more fall to yield in one year, but will bear an immense crop the following year. This was particularly noticeable during the past year. The trees which bore the largest crop last year were small producers this year, while those bearing but little last year were the largest producers in the orchard this year.

A FLOOD OF FLAME

Burning Acids Floated on Water.

Peculiar and Serious Fire at Goodrich Plant.

Fire partially destroyed the interior of the building used by the Dipping department of the Goodrich Rubber Co., Friday evening, shortly before 5:30 and caused damage to the extent of \$1,000. Several batches of rubber gum were destroyed and the machinery was damaged considerably. The building in which the fire started is located on Main st., near the large new building which has just been completed. It was caused by the breaking of an electric light, sparks from which ignited some rubber cement. The fire soon spread through the room, and barrels of acids which were standing around soon caught fire and the entire room of this department was a mass of flames. The fire departments responded immediately and began to pour streams of water into the building which seemed to have no effect on the fire, as the great amount of acids was continually feeding it.

The large amount of water turned into the building soon over-flowed the floor and the water rushed out and down the street, together with the acids which were burning. The flood became a running mass of flames which threatened the large building nearby. Trenches were soon dug and the water and burning acids turned into the street. The fire department worked for over three hours and finally got the fire under control. Walter Reese, who is employed at the plant, was overcome by fumes and was found by firemen lying unconscious on the floor of the building. He was taken to the hospital. Several other employees were also overcome by the fumes, but all will recover.

About the same time as the Goodrich fire, an alarm was turned in from box 39 and a general alarm sent in. All the departments responded and the last fire proved to be in the shoe store of Mr. R. J. Whelan, at the corner of Main and Barges sts. It was caused by the explosion of a gasoline lamp. Employees from the Goodrich Rubber Co. were passing the store at the time and rushed in and put it out. The damage will amount to about \$200. Mr. Whelan was seriously burned about the hands.

CANALS

Very Important In Commerce.

Good Condition of Ohio Canal.

New Lock Advocated and More Boats Needed.

Friday the following sentiment was expressed by a man who has always viewed canals from the highlands: "Ever since I have thought much about the canal question I have considered that the best thing to do in view of the agitation of the last few years is to abolish these artificial waterways."

The reply he got was: "What would become of the people who get their livelihood on the canals, and own boats which are the same to the possessors as dwelling houses are to other people?" This was a feature of the problem that was not easily disposed of, and the only satisfactory conclusion was that the state would have to make good the loss to those who live on the canals.

A conversation Friday with Capt. J. H. Morrison, collector at Lock 1, and with Mr. Charles Hatch, superintendent of the northern division of the Ohio canal, soon dispelled the idea that the canal system is not of great consequence.

Both Capt. Morrison and Mr. Hatch agreed that the past season had been a remarkably good one for heavy tonnage and a large amount of business. They also agreed that canals exercise a wholesome curb on the railroads by taking a certain amount of freight away from them.

Capt. Morrison declared that the season of 1902 has been the best experienced for several years, notwithstanding the fact that the Diamond Match Co. did not receive lumber over the canal this year. He says about 45 boats operated over this division between Cleveland and Trenton this year, carrying coal, lumber, hay straw, grain, lime, cement, etc. A greater amount of freight goes towards Cleveland than comes down.

Capt. Morrison placed the shortage of boats at 40 to 50 but Supt. Hatch put the figures much higher. He declared that 200 more boats than were in service could have been used the past summer, chiefly because of the great scarcity of cars. The Phillips Thomas Co., could have used 100 more boatsloads, and the Cleveland Paper Co., of Cleveland, 50 more, he stated.

Mr. Hatch was especially strong in his belief that the artificial waterways are becoming more important every year, and that the conditions are getting better. He thinks the business men of Akron ought to see the necessity of improving the Ohio canal, as it would wonderfully improve the shipping facilities of the city.

"It was the Ohio canal that made Akron," he said, "because most of the business of the county was transacted at Cuyahoga Falls until the canal was built. It was the Ohio canal that also made Cleveland an important commercial point for some years." Mr. Hatch even favors the construction of a lock at State Mill so that the boats can be raised to the level of the chain of lakes south of Akron and pass over them. He believes that this improvement can be brought about if the people of Akron will go about it in the right manner.


The season for 1902 has practically closed, though boats are still moving, and Friday were breaking through three inches of ice between Clinton and Akron.

Mr. Hatch is now making out a report to the state Board of Public Works. The Chief Engineer of this Board, Mr. Chas. E. Perkins, of Columbus, and Mr. W. G. Johnston, the local member of the State Board, were to gether this week and examined into the physical condition of the canal which they found to be very satisfactory.
