
Place tank in ground or cellar underneath the closet. Next locate bowl as close to wall as possible, leaving sufficient space between wall and closet for 4 inch vent pipe.

Mark around bowl and pipe at floor and cut holes.

Connect bowl, dip pipe and tank and caulk all joints with putty, white lead or ochre.

Form a ring of putty all around dip pipe, then place bowl and fasten bowl to floor by screws.

The four inch pipe should be run inside the room as shown or to a convenient chimney connection.



The vent pipe should extend at least 2 feet above peak of roof.

To charge the tank, thoroughly dissolve one charge of chemical in water before emptying into tank. This is done by dissolving about one-third of the drum of chemical at a time in a pail of water. Then empty into tank so that the liquid is 3 inches deep in the tank.

When the tank becomes filled it should be emptied by pail, pump or drain cock if one is used. Throw contents in any convenient place.

To recharge, simply repeat above operation.

Only toilet paper should be used. This is important.

OUR CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY with respect to sanitation does not end with the installation of sanitary fixtures in the home. A man may install sanitary closets in his own buildings, but his children may be exposed at school, or his entire family may be exposed at church or other public assembly. Unsanitary public closets necessarily form distributing centers from which germs of deadly diseases may spread.

IT IS NOW A MATTER OF COMMON KNOWLEDGE

that the outdoor closet is a menace to public health. Rains carry the contents long distances and microbes of disease are spread broadcast; while the flies that swarm about carry germs to the kitchen and dining rooms.

It is a permanent built-in-the-house closet that requires neither water, sewer, cesspool nor septic tank.

The County Budget Commission will meet at the office of the County Auditor, on Monday, Aug. 3, 1914, for the purpose of considering the budgets of the several taxing boards of the county. The amounts so fixed will determine the tax rate, in the several townships, villages and school districts for the ensuing year, exclusive of the state rate. The County Commission will continue its meetings, as nearly as is practicable, according to the schedule that follows.

The meetings will be open to the public and any one, particularly the taxpayers, will have an opportunity to be heard. The County Budget Commission earnestly solicits the attendance of any and all who may be interested.

Especial attention is called to the meeting to consider the County Levy on Saturday A. M., August 15, at the Court House.

All meetings will be held at the Court House, except those to consider the levies for Wadsworth township and Wadsworth Village, which will be held at the Council rooms at Wadsworth on the dates given below.
