This service will also be free and a messenger boy will accompany visitors to these temporary abodes, free of charge.

Those contemplating coming to Columbus during Fair Week may address the Columbus Chamber of Commerce and have rooms assigned to them in advance. Automobile parties should stop at the free information bureau and will be informed about garage and parking facilities.

The balcony of the Chamber of Commerce auditorium will be used as a check room and attendants will take care of packages and baskets. The ground floor of the auditorium will be open which visitors may use to
