NOT A BAD IDEA

It does not appear to be generally known that the new postal money orders may be cashed at any money order office in the continental United States, (Alaska excepted,) regardless of the office upon which they were drawn, provided the order is presented for payment within 30 days from the date of issue. After 30 days it is payable only at the office upon which it is drawn.
A contemplated innovation in the postal service is the issue of a postal card which will bear the telephone number of the addressee. When the card arrives at the post office of its destination, the postmaster will call up the addressee and read the message over the telephone, as is now done by the telegraph companies. Later the card is delivered in the usual manner. This plan will beat the postal delivery service by a good margin.

All bids must state the number of bonds bid for and the gross amount of the bid and accrued interest to date of delivery, and be accompanied by a certified check payable to the Treasurer of Medina Village for \$200.00 per cent of the amount of the bonds bid for, upon the condition that if the bid is accepted the bidder will receive and pay for such bonds within ten days from the date of the award said check to be retained by the Village as stipulated damages, in the event that the bidder shall fail to perform such condition.
Each bidder, as part of his bid, agree to furnish free of cost to said village he blanks upon which said bonds are to be executed.
