**Council Lets Big Contract**

At noon last Saturday the contract for the extension of water pipes on N. Huntington, Union, Mill and South Broadway streets was awarded by the village council to Roy Oatman, his being the lowest out of six bids. The contract exacts that Mr. Oatman take care of all the excavating, filling, furnishing of material and to keep the work in repair for six months. He was given 20 days from Monday of this week in which to begin the work and 50 days thereafter in which to complete it.  
The extension is for the purpose of affording greater protection against fire and to supply water for private use to those property owners on the above named streets who erstwhile have been without the privilege and who have been seeking it from council for a long time. The work of the new extension will comprise several new fire plugs and hydrants.

**WADSWORTH HIGH DEFEATS KENT**


