An alarm was turned in and part of the local company responded, though little was to be done after it arrived. Mr. Maple and family had been able to get the fire under control, and had confined the damage principally to one room.

The boys' class, under the leadership of John Beck, have installed a telephone in the choir loft of the M. E. church, which, in connection with regular use, will be used to cheer up the "shut-ins" and those unable to attend services by connecting them with this phone, thus enabling them to hear musical services and concerts of various kinds. It is the plan also to favor these "shut-ins" with the musical part of the regular Sunday services and whenever the organ is used for recital purposes. In some cases the phone will be placed in such a position that the listener will be able to hear the sermon or part of it.

The get-together meeting and social given by the local Y. M. C. A. boys to the Weymouth and Granger boys at the home of Dr. G. H. Smith on South Court street last Saturday night was one of the most pleasant events of the kind the boys have enjoyed. Donald Lorie of Central Y. M. C. A., Cleveland, addressed the boys, as did also Mr. Joseph Andrews of the Old Phoenix National Bank, who spoke to the boys on certain phases of the civil war. Besides the addresses there was excellent music by Ralph Harrington, violinist and Fred Bohley, vocalist. Refreshments were served. This meeting was for boys 14 years of age or older, a like meeting for the younger group to be given a little later.

SCHOOL NEWS

At a meeting of the district superintendents held at Medina, Thursday, March 25, several important matters were decided. Owing to the fact that the North Eastern Ohio Teachers' association has decided to hold its meeting on April 9 and 10, at Youngstown, it was thought best not to hold the Medina County Teachers' meeting on that day and as there are important meetings on the 17th already scheduled, it was decided to postpone the county meeting until next fall, as the eight-month schools will close on April 23, in many instances. The superintendents regretted very much to do this, but under the circumstances it seemed the only course to pursue. The plans for the spring meeting will be carried out next fall at the first meeting of the county association.

The Medina School Masters' club will postpone its meeting until Friday night, April 16. All members please take notice. Several candidates will be initiated at this meeting.

The district superintendents unanimously decided to take part in the state spelling contest and appointed Friday, April 16, as the day for the county match. From all townships maintaining a high school two contestants will be chosen, one from the grades and one from high school. The candidates for county honors will meet at Medina at 2:30 p. m., April 16. A list of 100 words will be furnished by the county superintendent for each group and the pupils making the highest percentage will be declared county champions. The winners in the county will be sent later to Columbus to take part in the state contest. Several districts have already had spelling contests which have aroused much enthusiasm among pupils and parents. A trip to Columbus and a chance to become state champion speller is a prize worth striving for. All teachers are urged to prepare their pupils for the township contests, which will be conducted by the district superintendents. It was decided in case of disagreement as to the proper spelling of a word that a spelling recognized by Webster, The Century, or The Standard dictionary should be considered correct. After the written examination, an old-fashioned spell-down will be held while the examiners are grading the lists.

The Medina county fair board has decided to again offer a \$50 prize for a stock-judging contest, open to all boys and young men under 21 years of age. Ohio State University will send men into the county to give instruction to those desiring to enter this contest. Last year Seymour Hodinott of Montville township won the prize. Chas. Thompson of Sharon won second prize of \$25 and Paul Dumscha secured third prize of \$10. A prize will also be given to the Medina county boy raising the best pig. Rules and regulations for this contest may be secured from the secretary of the fair board of Medina. These two prizes, together with the potato and canning contests, ought to give the boys and girls of Medina county plenty at which to keep busy during the summer.

During the week of April 26, Miss Okey and Miss White of Agricultural College of Ohio State University will give instruction in Home Economics at the county normal school in Medina. All teachers of the county are invited to attend these meetings, as the work given will aid in teaching domestic science.

All final examinations for eighth-grade pupils will be given by the county superintendent. Different lists will be furnished for the eight-month and nine-month schools. Pupils who fail on the early examinations will have an opportunity to try again on the examination for pupils in the longer term schools if they have the consent of their teacher and district superintendent.

Next year the county will have a uniform course of study and not only will the yearly and term examinations be uniform, but also the monthly tests will be the same throughout the county. During the summer months a careful course will be worked out by the county and district superintendents. This will outline the work for the year so that a teacher may know just what to expect from the beginning. Each month outlines, giving in detail the work to be accomplished, will be furnished to the teachers. To aid this work it is hoped that all the county schools may start at the same time next fall.

Contest for boys and girls in Medina county be encouraged by parents and teachers?

County Superintendent C. E. Jenks and the various district superintendents have been working out the details of this contest for several weeks and, as noted in the school news for this week, some of the district superintendents have already held their elimination contests and are drilling the winners for the county match. Wadsworth village, though not a part of the county school district, will send two representatives to the contest.

In order to show its interest and appreciation of this movement for better spelling in Medina county, the SENTINEL will offer two prizes of \$5.00 each to the winners of the two contests, one for the grades and one for the high school pupils.
