A PRACTICAL ILLUSTRATION HOW MONEY GROWS.

Here is a bit of history which comes to us from Franklin, Mass. In connection with the Franklin Public Library, which was founded by Benjamin Franklin, there is a Children's Library, which was opened Jan. 17, 1906, the 200th anniversary of Benjamin Franklin. There first 1,500 books were purchased from funds accumulated as follows: Mr. Joseph G. Ray, an old resident of Franklin, Mass. deposited in the bank \$25 in 1848 and \$50 in 1860. These deposits with accumulated interest amounted to \$1,087.08.
