BLIND COMMISSION BUSY
The Ohio Commission for the Blind is doing a lot of good work just at the present time with its home teaching. Totally and partially blind men and women are being employed to go into the homes of the blind and teach them occupations that will help them pass away the long dark hours and at the same time prove profitable to them. Many women who are too busy to help make articles for the soldier boys have turned in their order to the blind commission and the sightless women of the state are doing

this work, only charging small fees for their labor. The state acts as agent for these blind women, and no charge is made to either the worker or the subscriber. The headquarters of the commission are in Columbus.

COAL FOR FARMERS

Farmers who need coal for threshing machines will get it promptly if they will notify J. H. Roan, in charge of the state coal clearing house, Columbus. Mr. Roan has taken steps to see that there is the least possible delay in making these shipments promptly so as not to delay the farmer who is now in the midst of his busiest season. It is estimated that it will require 7,000 tons to satisfy the demand of Ohio farmers during the next two weeks.

OBITUARY

Mrs. Sophia Gunsaulis, daughter of the late Rev. Ephraim Hunsberger and wife, was born in Pennsylvania on the first day of June of the year 1841. She was one of thirteen children and grew up to young womanhood under her parental roof. It was about this time that she was united in marriage to Jacob Gunsaulis on the 14th day of July 1861. This union was an unusually long and happy one and was blessed with nine children: eight sons and one daughter—six of whom remain to mourn the loss of one of the best mothers that sons ever had.

For seven years they lived on her father's farm after which they bought the place and remained there for thirty-two years. It was during this time that her mother died leaving ten motherless children.

When seventeen years old she was baptized and received into the fel-

lowship of the Mennonite church, Wadsworth, then located on the Diagonal Road. From that time to this, for fifty-nine years, she was actively and wholeheartedly identified with all of its activities.

The following children survive: Clara Gunsaulis, Ervin, William and David of Wadsworth, and Oliver and Milton of Akron. Perry, Franklin and Ross preceded their mother to the grave. Besides these the following brothers and sisters also survive: John of Kansas, Abe of Sterling, Ill.; William and Frank, Augusta Hirschey of Elton, Louisiana, Katherine Thomas of Piqua, Ohio, and Mrs. S. R. Krupp and Mrs. Mahlon Shelly of Wadsworth. Also the following grandchildren: Sophie and Stanley Beery, Joyce, Lloyd, Margaret, Katherine and Doris Gunsaulis; as well as two great-grandchildren: Lois Beery of Wadsworth and Vivian Lever, of Akron.

The funeral services were conducted from the home and subsequently from the Mennonite church, Tuesday afternoon, July 24. A large number of relatives and friends from Medina, Piqua, Spencer and other places were in attendance, which fact together with beautiful floral offerings testified to the esteem in which this noble mother was held by one and all. The funeral services were in charge of her pastor assisted by Rev. C. B. Etter and B. L. Westenbarger. Burial was made in the family plot in Woodlawn, Wadsworth.

NEW USE FOR CONVICTS

A new use has been found for the prisoners of the state and hundreds of them are now employed canning vegetables for winter use in feeding

the 23,000 awards of the state of Ohio. A complete canning factory has been installed at the London prison farm and the men are working long hours putting up fruit grown on the farm in cans made by the prisoners at the penitentiary. Just now only beans, rhubarb, and beans are being canned but later on tomatoes and corn will be canned. It is planned to pack at least 75,000 cans of tomatoes and corn during the next few weeks.

Estimated cost of construction \$13,251.26. Date set for completion is November 15, 1917.


The bidder must submit a proposal and contract bond for an amount equal to the amount of the estimated cost.
