#### RESOLUTION

Whereas, it is impossible to carry on the Medina Public Schools, as at present and heretofore conducted, and pay the necessary expenses thereof without additional funds, therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Education of Medina Village acting under the provisions of Section 7592 and 7593 G. C. hereby make an additional levy of 3 mills upon each dollar of taxable property of said school district for all school purposes for five consecutive years beginning with the tax year 1919, that this proposition be submitted to the electors of said school district at the regular election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1918, at the usual voting places in said school district. That the electors desiring to vote for said proposition shall have printed upon their ballots the following: "For additional levy of 3 mills for five years for all school purposes—Yes," and those opposed to the proposition shall have printed upon their ballots the following: "For additional levy of 3 mills for five years for all school purposes—No," and each elector shall place a cross "X" on their ballot in the blank space before the proposition in which he may favor or desire to vote for, and that this resolution be published for three consecutive weeks in the Medina Gazette and Medina Sentinel the first publication to be in the issues of said newspapers published on the 23rd day of August, 1918.

#### ORDINANCE

"To Issue Bonds for the Purpose of Purchasing a Fire Engine for the Village of Medina, Ohio."  
Whereas, at a special election held for that purpose in the Village of Medina, Ohio, on the 16th day of July A. D. 1918, the question of issuing and selling the bonds of said village in the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a fire engine for the village of Medina, Ohio, was submitted to a vote

of the qualified electors of said village, and,

Whereas, two-thirds of the voters at such election upon the question of the issuance and sale of said bonds voted in favor thereof,

NOW, THEREFORE,  
BE IT ORDAINED,

By the Council of the Village of Medina, State of Ohio, five members elected or appointed thereto, concurring hereinafter:

Section I. That the bonds of said village be issued and sold in the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.) for the purpose of purchasing a fire engine for the village of Medina, Ohio; said bonds shall be numbered consecutively from one to twenty-four inclusive, and each bond shall be in the denomination of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00); said bonds shall bear the date of September 1st, 1918, and shall become due and payable as follows: to-wit:—one bond to become due and payable on March 1st, 1920 and one bond on September 1st, 1920, and one bond on the first day of March and September of the years 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928 respectively, and one bond on March 1st, 1929, and one bond on September 1st, 1929, and one bond on March 1st, 1930, and the last two bonds on September 1st, 1930; said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum payable semi-annually on the 1st day of March and September of each year after date thereof, evidenced by coupons attached thereto; and both interest and principal shall be payable at the office of the Sinking Fund Trustees in and for said village of Medina, Ohio.

Section II. Said bonds shall express upon their face the purpose for which they are issued and that they are issued in pursuance of this ordinance. They shall be prepared, issued and delivered under the direction of the Finance Committee of the Council and the Village Clerk, and shall be signed by the Mayor of said Village and by the Village Clerk, and sealed with the corporate seal of said Village, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the Village Clerk with his signature thereto, or he shall have his signature printed or lithographed thereon.

Section III. Said bonds shall be first offered at par and accrued interest to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund in their official capacity, and if the Sinking Fund Trustees refuse to take any or all of said bonds at par and accrued interest, then said bonds not so taken shall be offered at par and accrued interest to the Trustees of the Village School District, and if said latter board refuses to take any or all of said bonds, then said bonds shall be taken as provided by law to the Industrial Commission of Ohio, and if not purchased by any said board, the same shall be advertised for public sale and sold in the manner provided by law, but not for less than their par value and accrued interest.

Section IV. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds, except the premiums and accrued interest thereon, shall be placed in the Village Treasury to the credit of the Fire Engine Fund and shall be used for the purpose of purchasing a fire engine for the village of Medina, Ohio, and for no other purpose; and the premiums and accrued interest received from such sale shall be transferred to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund, to be applied by them in the manner provided by law.

Section V. That to provide a sinking fund for the final redemption at maturity of the Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) in bonds hereby authorized, and to pay the interest on same as it becomes due, there shall be and there is hereby ordered levied upon all taxable property of the village of Medina, in addition to all other taxes, a direct tax annually during the years 1918 to 1930 inclusive, in an amount sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the final redemption of said bonds at maturity. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered levied, certified and extended upon the tax rolls and collected by the same officers in the same manner and at the same time as the taxes for general purposes in each of said years are certified and extended and collected, and all funds derived from said tax shall be placed in said sinking fund, which, together with all interest collected on the same shall be irrevocably pledged to the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds, when and as the same shall fall due.

Section VI. That this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, welfare, health and safety, and as such shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law. The necessity therefore arises from the breaking down and wearing out of the one and only fire engine belonging to said village of Medina, Ohio, which fact threatens said village and the inhabitants thereof with an entire failure of fire protection, much to the danger, inconvenience and detriment of the safety, peace and welfare of said inhabitants.
