The first meeting of the year for the teachers of the one and two room schools was held at the Medina high school building, Saturday, Sept. 21. Although the weather was bad the meeting was well attended, and much interest manifested by all present.

Dist. Supt. C. F. McFadden talked to the teachers on the "Fundamentals of the Curriculum," emphasizing the use of correct methods in reading and number work, and urging the importance of mastery in these subjects.

County Supt. D. W. Pearce talked on the subject, "The Recitation," pointing out the essential elements of a recitation and how to best secure them.
