Since the reopening of the schools we have visited the following townships: Wadsworth, Sharon, Granger, Lafayette, Guilford, Medina and Brunswick. In most cases pupils seem to realize that it is necessary to do more intensive work to make up for time lost.

The teachers, likewise, are doing their part in making every effort to establish the prevacation school morale.

Failure to receive in sufficient quantity and at the proper time the material for the Victory Boys' and Victory Girls' "Earn and Give" campaign has caused disappointment in some quarters. For this, I am very sorry.

No more supplies are obtainable. The difficulty seems to have been in New York City. However, I have the promise of certificates for all who have given one dollar or more.

These will be sent out as soon as they are received. Any boy or girl will be proud to have such certificates. Any teacher having an over supply of buttons or window posters will oblige us by returning them to this office, thus making it possible to supply boys and girls with these tokens who would otherwise be denied them.

In pursuance of law, I, Charles Frank, Treasurer of Medina County, Ohio, do hereby give notice that the number of mills levied on each dollar of property listed for taxation within said County for the tax year 1918 is as follows:


