THE SEVILLE HERALD SUSPENDS

The Seville Herald, edited by W. A. Robertson, carried its own obituary notice in the last issue, published Thursday. Robertson has been editor of the paper for nearly a year and a half and his notice of suspension makes some pertinent suggestions which he evidently believes would greatly benefit the community as a whole. He says:

"With this issue The Herald passes out of existence.

"It joins the thousand or more papers that have succumbed to the inevitable during the past year. As was stated in these columns some nine months ago that unless the people of the town supported the paper better than they were then doing, it would be necessary to suspend. At no time has the subscription list been what a paper in a community like this should have. Nearly every one in town reads the paper, but unfortunately for the pocket book of the publisher, many of them belong to the class that think it is cheaper to 'borry' the paper from a neighbor than to be public spirited enough to subscribe. Of course such 'circulation' has tended to make the advertising space valuable, but has not helped 'keep the wolf from the door' of the publisher.

"Before the paper was started, we were informed from various sources, both in town and out, that the town wanted a paper.

"Being a stranger to you, the conclusion was that such, apparently, was the case. This, however, was true only of a minority. Judging from the indifference of the majority, we are forced to the conclusion that the paper is not wanted.

"Another thing that tends to this conclusion is the fact that the main idea of many is to see that the news of the town is sent to the papers at Medina, and the home paper can copy from them. Former publishers of the papers here state that this has always been the case here.

"We have endeavored to get out a paper that would be a credit to the town. This has been done at quite a financial loss. While the paper has not been as good as we had hoped to make it, it has been better than the financial returns warrant.

"What Seville lacks is a proper home town spirit. Things that tend to the upbuilding of a town are, first of all the supporting of all home institutions, instead of patronizing out of town concerns. This is true not only of the newspaper proposition, but of all other lines of business.

"To those of the people who have stood by the paper and given it all the financial support possible, both in advertising and job work, we extend our sincere thanks."

WILL PAY TO PACK

BUTTER ON FARMS

With butter at 50 cents a pound, the farmer producing even a small amount, can well afford to pack it for

winter, says Prof. R. B. Stoltz, of the Ohio State University dairy department. In order for it to keep properly, however, it is more essential than usual that care be taken in the making and that all utensils should be sterilized.

In the first place, butter for packing should be made only from pasteurized pure sweet cream. The cream may be pasteurized by putting the cream can in a wash-boiler and keeping it at 45 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes. After heating, it should be cooled as soon as possible to 60 degrees. Cooling may be quickened by stirring it

intermittently, care being taken to avoid churning.

Before churning add sour milk starter. Churn from 35 to 40 minutes. Wash the butter by drawing off the buttermilk and adding the same amount of clean water. Wash it again if necessary. Salt as usual.

The butter may be packed by two methods: 1. Pack in a sterilized earthen jar. Place a sterilized white cloth over the top next to the butter. Cover the cloth with a layer of salt one-eighth inch thick. To aid in re-


moving the cloth, have it large enough so that the edges will stick up two inches around the inside of the jar. 2. Pack in brine. First cut the butter into one pound prints and wrap in a clean parchment paper. Tie on the parchment. Immerse in a brine solution containing one pound of salt to four pounds of water. Weight down the butter with a sterile dish and brick. As the brine evaporates, more may be added.

The cooler the butter is kept the better.
