For grading roadway, constructing drainage structures and paving with reinforced concrete. Width: Pavement 10 ft. Roadway 26 ft. Length 7887.7 ft. or 1.49 miles. Date set for completion December 1, 1920. The bidder must submit with his bid a proposal bond for an amount equal to five (5 per cent.) of the estimated cost of the work, not more than ten (\$10,000.00) thousand dollars. NOTICE

To Dog Owners, Keepers or Harbors of Dogs "A word to the wise, is sufficient." Read House Bill No. 493, passed May 21, 1919. Section 5652-1A, which reads in part as follows: Sec. 5652. Every person who owns, keeps or harbors a dog more than three months of age annually, before the first day of January of each year, shall file together with a registration fee of one dollar for each male or effectively spayed female dog, and dog registration fee of three dollars for each female dog unspayed, in the office of the county auditor of the county in which such dog is kept or harbored, an application for registration for the following year beginning the first day of January of such year stating the age, sex, color, character of hair, whether short or long, and breed, if known, of such dog, also the name and address of the owner of such dog.

Sec. 5652-1. Every owner of a kennel of dogs bred or kept for sale shall in like manner as in section 5652 provided, make application for the registration of such kennel, and pay there-with to the county auditor a registration fee of \$10, for such kennel. Provided, however, the owner of such kennel shall in addition to paying such kennel fees, comply with all the requirements of section 5652 with respect to every dog more than three months of age belonging to such kennel not kept constantly confined in such kennel.

Sec. 5652-7. County sheriffs shall patrol their respective counties, seize and impound on sight all dogs more than three months of age, except dogs kept constantly confined in a registered dog kennel found not wearing valid registration tags.

Sec. 5652-9. Dogs not wearing valid registration tags which have been seized by the sheriff and impounded as hereinbefore provided, shall be kept, housed and fed for three days, at the expiration of which time, unless previously redeemed by the owners thereof, such animal shall either be sold or be humanely destroyed; provided, however, that no dog so sold shall be discharged from such pound until such animal shall have been registered and furnished with a valid registration tag as herein before provided.

Sec. 5652-14. Whoever, being the owner, keeper or harbinger of a dog more than three months of age, or being the owner of a dog kennel falls to file the application for registration required by law, or to pay the legal fee therefor, shall be fined not more than twenty-five dollars, and the costs of prosecution.

Sec. 5652-15. Whoever owns, keeps or harbors a dog wearing a fictitious, altered or invalid registration tag or a registration tag not issued by the county auditor in connection with the registration of such animal, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, and the costs of prosecution.

Owners, harborers and keepers of dogs that were more than 3 months of age, prior to Jan. 1st, 1920, should have secured registration tags previous to that time.

But, as a courtesy to those who have not complied with the above requirements, I will not enforce the law until after March 15th.

Warning: Those who do not take advantage of this opportunity, must pay the penalty.

Don't forget that whenever a dog becomes 3 months old, it comes under this law, and that the law requires that the dog wear the registration tag, unless constantly confined in a registered kennel.

Persons knowing of a dog for which a registration tag has not been provided, will please lend me their assistance by advising me regarding the same.

Help me to cause every dog in Medina Co. to wear a legal registration tag.

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
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
