THINNING OF FRUIT SAVES ORCHARD TREES
Thinning of fruit is sometimes necessary with apples, peaches and plums to insure the production of the highest quality of fruit.
An apple tree will often produce sufficient bloom for 20 times the number of apples that it could possibly mature.
In some years the June drop of fruit removes about the right quantity, but at other times it is necessary to thin fruit by hand to prevent the trees from breaking down and to insure well-colored fruit.
For thinning apples, at the Ohio Experiment Station, it has been found that the best time is between 4 and 8 weeks after full bloom. Small shears or the thumb and fingers may be used to clip off the excess fruit.
With peaches and plums, thinning lessens the danger from rot and keeps the trees from breaking. On peach trees a distance of 6 inches may be made between fruits.
