The State Highway Commission has taken over the job of completing the Orrville Southern road, discharging the contractor and appointing another. The road which connects Orrville with the Lincoln Highway is now closed but will be open to the public within the next few weeks.

The molders at the foundry of the Ohio Blower & Body Co., at Orrville still remain out on strike, the company continuing its policy of an open shop. If the strike continues, the plant will be forced to close for lack of material.

The Red Cross nursing committee of Baughman and Green townships in Wayne county, which maintains a professional nurse, recently submitted a report showing that one-half of the children in those districts are under weight, six have discharging ears, fifteen have obstruction of the nose, one hundred and ten have abnormal throats, three hundred and forty-six have defective teeth and three have adenoids. In the last 16 months there were seven deaths from tuberculosis, 7 deaths of infants under 6 months of age, 5 deaths directly due to contagious diseases, 4 deaths under one month of age and nine still born.

The enumeration of youths of school age for the Orrville school district for the present year totals 994. Last year it was 927. C. J. Bowers and J. G. Goldsmith of Marshallville, were victors in a series of horse-pitching games last week at Orrville, the defeated being Judge T. W. Orr and Wm. G. Heebach.
