## How We Care For Your Meat Cars

When you see a Swift Refrigerator Car going by in a train, it seems a simple thing that it should be carrying fresh meat up and down the country.

To improve the educational standing of the state, the school term must be lengthened, because Ohio now ranks twenty seventh in number of days schools are kept open. Ohio must spend more money for the education of its youth for it now ranks twenty-first in expenditure per child attending school; fifteenth in expenditure per child of school age; seventeenth in expenditure for non-salary purposes. The per capita cost of education in Ohio is only \$7.19. The proportion of children in high schools must be increased, for Ohio ranks but nineteenth in per cent. of high school attendance. There has been a great growth in this particular within the last few years, but not sufficient to keep Ohio from being surpassed by many other states.

Since one of the most noteworthy educational developments of the country has been the increase and extension of high school advantages, bringing secondary education close to every American home and making access to such advantages easy as possible, a problem is here presented that claims attention as easy as possible, a problem is here presented that legitimately claims very careful attention. In 1913 there were 80,000 in Ohio high schools in 1919 there were 132,711 in attendance. In 1914 there were 8,043 in rural high schools, while in 1919 there were 16,440. This means that since 1914 rural high school enrollment has more than doubled.

## MEDINA HIGH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT RANKS HIGH

The four leading counties of the state in percentage of high school attendance are Medina, Champaign, Delaware, and Preble. The high school attendance in these counties last year was 15.4 per cent of the total school enrollment. This growth can be largely accounted for through the efforts that have been made to make high schools accessible to children in rural districts and through transportation to bring pupils to the very doors of education.
