

**BROOD SOWS HUNT BEANS  
FOR WINTR EXERCISE**

As a means of providing a part of the ration and to keep them in good condition, James Folsom of Scioto county lets his brood sows hunt soy beans during the winter. Mr. Folsom raises soybeans in corn and lets the market hogs harvest the crop. Incidentally this has proved to be a profitable practice. After the fattening hogs have been removed from the fields, the brood sows are turned in. Each pleasant day during the winter the brood sows range the fields in search of scattered beans. Four sows last spring raised 35 pigs and five sows this fall farrowed 53 pigs and are raising 46 of them.

**AN ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE to borrow money and issue notes therefor in anticipation of the collection of special assessments for the improvement of North Court Street in the Village of Medina, Ohio from the north line of Liberty Street to the north line of Union Street by grading, draining and paving same.

Section 1. That to provide a fund in anticipation of the collection of special assessments ascertained in conformity with law to amount to Sixteen Thousand One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$16,150.00) for the improvement of North Court Street in the Village of Medina, Ohio, from the North line of Liberty Street to the north line of Union Street by grading, draining and paving the same, the Mayor and Clerk be and they hereby are authorized and directed to borrow money and issue notes therefor in accordance with Section 3515 of the General Code of Ohio, for the amount of Sixteen Thousand One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$16,150.00).

Section 2. That said notes shall be signed and sealed as municipal bonds and sealed and shall bear interest at the rate not to exceed six per cent per annum, and shall become due and payable at the office of the Sinking Fund Trustees of the Village of Medina, Ohio, on or before six months after the date of issuance thereof, and shall not exceed in their aggregate amount the estimated cost and expense of that portion of the improvement to be specially assessed as provided by law and shall recite upon their face the purpose for which they are issued and that they are issued in pursuance of and in conformity to this ordinance.

Section 3. That special assessment bonds of the Village of Medina shall be authorized, issued and sold for the redemption of said notes in manner and form as provided by law and by an ordinance determining to proceed with the improvement of said street and assessed by the Council of said village on the 15th day of May 1917, and that all assessments collected for said improvement together with all unexpended balance remaining in the fund after the cost and expense of said improvement shall have been paid, shall be and are hereby pledged to the prompt payment of said notes and the interest thereon until both are fully provided for.

Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore passed for the same purpose as this ordinance and inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
