AN ORDINANCE

To extend and construct water mains in East Smith Road, Spring Grove Street, North Broadway, Foundry Street, Bronson Street, West Liberty Street, Lafayette Road, Elmwood Avenue, Wadsworth Road and Baxter Street, all in the Village of Medina, Ohio, and to issue and sell the bonds of said Village in the sum of \$25,800.00 for the purpose of paying the cost and expense of extending and constructing said water mains.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Medina, Ohio, three-fourths of its members elected or appointed thereto concurring:

Sec. 1. That for the purpose of supplying water to the Village of Medina and the inhabitants thereof, that it is deemed necessary to extend and construct water mains in the following named streets in the Village of Medina, Ohio, to-wit:

East Smith Road, from Harmony Street eastwardly a distance of 1850 feet.

Spring Grove Street, from Smith Road to Washington Street, a distance of 686 feet.

North Broadway, from Union Street to Homestead Street a distance of 350 feet.

Foundry Street, from end of present main west a distance of 300 feet.

Bronson Street, from Medina Street to Broadway Street a distance of 200 feet.

West Liberty Street, from end of present main to west corporation line a distance of 643 feet.

Lafayette Road, from Elmwood Avenue westwardly a distance of 3160 feet.

Elmwood Avenue, from Mill Street to Lafayette Road a distance of 407 feet.

Wadsworth Road, from the end of present main, south-easterly a distance of 110 feet.

Baxter Street, from Smith Road to Lafayette Road a distance of 1990 feet.

Sec. 2. That the plans, specifications, profiles and estimate of cost and expense of said improvement prepared by F. C. Randall, engineer, and now on file with the Village Clerk, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

Sec. 3. That for the purpose of providing a fund wherewith to pay the cost and expense of extending and constructing the aforesaid mains that it is deemed necessary to issue and sell the bonds of the Village of Medina, Ohio, in the sum of \$25,800.00.

Sec. 4. That the bonds of the Village of Medina, Ohio, be and hereby are ordered issued in the sum of \$25,800.00, dated April 1st, 1921 for the purpose aforesaid; that said bonds shall be known as War Main Extension Bonds and shall be fifty-one in number, the first of which shall be in the denomination of \$500.00 and the remaining fifty of which shall be in the denomination of \$500.00 each and the bonds shall be numbered consecutively from one to fifty-one inclusive and shall each bear interest at the rate of six percent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of April and the first day of October of each year, evidenced by interest coupons attached thereto.

That said bonds shall be payable at the office of the Village Clerk as follows, viz:

Sec. 5. That said bonds shall be executed upon their face the purposes for which they are issued and that they are issued in pursuance of this ordinance; they shall be signed and executed by the Mayor and Village Clerk of the Village of Medina, Ohio, and the Corporate Seal of said Village attached thereto; and shall be prepared, issued and delivered

under the direction of the Village Council, the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed by the Village Clerk, with his signature thereto, or his may have his signature printed or lithographed thereon.

Sec. 6. Said bonds shall be first offered for sale at par and accrued interest to the trustees of the sinking fund of the Village of Medina, Ohio, in the official capacity, and if said sinking fund trustees refuse to take any or all of said bonds at par and accrued interest, then said bonds not taken shall be offered at par and accrued interest to the Board of Commissioners of the sinking fund of the Medina Village School District, and if said later named Board refuses to take any or all of said bonds at par and accrued interest, then said bonds not so taken shall be offered in manner and form as provided by law to the individual Commission of Ohio, and if not purchased by any of said boards such of said bonds that are not so taken shall be advertised for public sale and sold in the manner provided by law, but for not less than par value and accrued interest to date of delivery.

Sec. 7. That the proceeds from the sale of said bonds, excepting premiums, if any, and accrued interest shall be turned over to the Board of Public Affairs of the Village of Medina, Ohio and used and expended by them for the purpose set forth in this ordinance and for no other purpose whatsoever, and whatever balance, if any, shall remain after the completion of said improvements, shall be turned over to the Trustees of the Sinking Fund of the said Village to be applied upon the payment of said bonds when the same shall become due and payable.

Sec. 8. That to provide a sinking fund for the final redemption, at maturity of the bonds herein authorized, and to pay the interest on the same as it shall become due and payable, there shall be and there is hereby ordered levied upon all the taxable property of the Village of Medina, Ohio, in addition to all other taxes, a direct annual tax each year during the life of said bonds and in an amount sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it becomes due and payable and to provide a sinking fund for the final redemption of said bonds at maturity. Said tax shall be and is hereby ordered levied, certified and extended upon the tax duplicates and collected by the same officers in the same manner and at the same time as the taxes for general purposes during said time are certified, extended and collected, and all funds derived from the collection of said tax shall be placed in said sinking fund which shall, together with all interest collected on the same, be irrevocably pledged to the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds, when and as the same shall become due and payable.

Sec. 9. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.


