**ACT WOULD HIT MANY DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS**

Two hundred and sixteen district school superintendents will be legislated out of office if the senate concurs in the enactment of the Faris bill which the house of representatives on Tuesday passed by vote of 88 to 20.

Should the bill eventually become a law, it is expected that more than one-half of these district superintendents will be compelled to make school connections in some other capacity, while the remainder would have a chance of re-employment in the capacity of assistant county superintendents.

Under the Faris bill not more than three assistant county superintendents may be employed to take the place of the district superintendents in any county. It is up to the local board whether any assistant superintendents are employed at all.

This is to be determined at a meeting of the presidents of the rural school boards before the first of August in any year. If a majority of these rural board presidents vote for assistant superintendents, the county board must provide them.

**MANY MEDINA WOMEN TAKE HYGIENE COURSE**

One hundred and twenty-five of Medina county's women and girls are taking the Home Hygiene Course offered by the Red Cross, under the direction of Miss Helen Felkner, R. N.

This means that one hundred and twenty-five homes have some member of the household who not only will be qualified to give first aid in time of illness and to care for the sick where otherwise the employment of a professional nurse might be re-

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quired, but who also will have acquired knowledge which will be put to practical use for the prevention of sickness and the improvement of the general health of the family.

Much patient study of time-tables and of the varying needs of members was required to arrange Miss Felkner's circuit so that she can give two lessons per week, of one and a half hours each, in the four towns—Leroy, Lodi, Medina and Spencer. This has finally been accomplished and a satisfactory working schedule is bringing much pleasure and profit to the classes.
