A RESOLUTION A resolution declaring it necessary to construct a sanitary sewer in North Court Street, from Union Street to Homestead Street, and in North Broadway from Union Street to Homestead Street and in Homestead Street from North Court Street to Harmony Lane, together with the necessary outfall sewer extending from Harmony Lane and connecting with Sewer Disposal Plant No. 1, all in Sewer District No. 1.

Whereas the owners of a majority of the front footage of all lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of North Court Street between Union Street and Homestead Street, and in North Broadway between Union Street and Homestead Street, and on Homestead Street between North Court Street and Harmony Lane, have petitioned in writing for the construction of a sanitary sewer in said streets between the points above named, together with the necessary outfall sewer extending said sanitary sewer from Harmony Lane to Sewer Disposal Plant No. 1, in Sewer District No. 1.

Now therefore, be it resolved, by the Council of the Village of Medina, Ohio (three-fourths of all members elected thereto concurring), that:

SEC. I. That it is by the Council deemed necessary to construct a sanitary sewer in North Court Street from Union Street to Homestead Street, and in North Broadway from Union Street to Homestead Street and in Homestead Street from North Court Street to Harmony Lane, together with the necessary outfall sewer extending said sanitary sewer from Harmony Lane to Sewer Disposal Plant No. 1, all in Sewer District No. 1.

SEC. II. That said sanitary sewers shall be constructed in accordance with the standard sewerage plan of said Village as heretofore adopted and now on file in the office of the Village Clerk, and that the estimate of the cost, and the amount of the bonds to be issued therefor, shall be assessed against and paid by the Village of Medina, and shall be assessed by the front footage against the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of said streets between the points above named, and said lots and lands are hereby found and determined to be specially benefited by reason of said improvement; that the cost and expense of said improvements shall include the expense of all surveys necessary and incident thereto and the expense of printing, publishing and serving notices, resolutions and ordinances required, and the cost and expense of the construction of said sanitary sewers and the necessary outfall sewer connecting the same with Sewer Disposal Plant No. 1, and shall include and interest on any bonds that may be issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred assessments and all other expenditures made necessary by reason of said improvement.

SEC. III. That the cost and expense of the construction of said sanitary sewers, and including said outfall sewer, except the one-fiftieth part thereof, shall be assessed against and paid by the Village of Medina, and shall be assessed by the front footage against the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of said streets between the points above named, and said lots and lands are hereby found and determined to be specially benefited by reason of said improvement; that the cost and expense of said improvements shall include the expense of all surveys necessary and incident thereto and the expense of printing, publishing and serving notices, resolutions and ordinances required, and the cost and expense of the construction of said sanitary sewers and the necessary outfall sewer connecting the same with Sewer Disposal Plant No. 1, and shall include and interest on any bonds that may be issued in anticipation of the collection of deferred assessments and all other expenditures made necessary by reason of said improvement.

SEC. IV. That the special assessment to be levied and assessed against the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of said streets between the points above named, shall be paid in ten annual installments, with interest at six per cent per annum, payable annually, provided however that the owner of any property so assessed may at his or her option pay such assessments in cash within twenty days from and after the passage of the assessing ordinance, in which case said cash assessment shall not include any item of interest upon bonds to be issued in anticipation of the collection of such deferred assessments.
