An account of the shocking accident that occurred near here on Monday, resulting in the death of Mr. Sidney A. Auble of Lodi, is given on page 1 of this paper.

We want to say just a few things as a warning about the railroad crossing where this accident happened. Just because the "Paducky," so called, because of its two-day trains, is supposed to be a veritable slow train thru Arkansaw, is no reason why one should not "stop, look and listen." About five hundred feet west from this crossing is a curve, with "W" on a post, but trainmen seldom obey that "W." It is down hill from Spencer to the river and the trains usually coast around this curve, making very little noise as to steam. This is the second accident to happen at this crossing. Remains of the other is still to be seen. We can do nothing for the dead, but I'm sure we can take warning from these two accidents and maybe prevent another.

Nancy Ensign Burkey was born in Richland county, Ohio, Feb. 11, 1845, and died April 9, 1921, aged 76 years, 1 month and 21 days. In 1863 she was united in marriage to Seymour Ensign of Spencer, Ohio, who departed this life April 8, 1905. To this union were born two sons, Edwin E. and Arthur Z. Ensign. On Oct. 14, 1912, she was united in marriage to Manford Burkey, who survives. Besides the husband and two sons, she leaves to mourn her loss three sisters, one brother, 13 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. She was a kind, Christian neighbor, willing to lend a helping hand and will be sadly missed by her many friends.

Ledora Olive Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar O. Clark, was born in Spencer township, July 14, 1920, and died April 5, 1921, at the age of 8 months and 21 days. She leaves to mourn her early departure the parents, one brother, Kenneth, one sister, Elma, two aunts, three uncles, with many more distant relatives. Funeral services were held by Rev. O. M. Peoples at the M. E. church on Thursday the 7th, at two o'clock, and burial was made in the cemetery near by.


