DEATH PREVENTS A REUNITED FAMILY

A death occurred in Rittman last week with attendant circumstances of an unusually distressing and almost tragic nature. E. Levy, who conducted a dray business there, died of lock-jaw, the result of stepping on a rusty nail a week previously.

Levy came to America just before the late war, leaving his wife and children in Poland until he could earn money to bring them over here. A few weeks ago he arranged with a steamship agency for the passage of two of his daughters, intending to send for the wife and other children a little later. It is believed the two daughters are now enroute and will not know of their father's death until they arrive at Ellis Island, when, unable to show the authorities a visible means of support it is likely they will be returned to their native country.

Levy had no relatives in this country except a sister in Rochester, N.Y. He was buried in Cleveland following his death in a hospital there where he had been removed from Rittman in the vain hope of saving his life.
