#### LITCHFIELD MAN UNDER BOND TO KEEP PEACE

Woman Alleges Threats to do Her Violence.

Litchfield is undergoing something of an agitation this week over a disaffection between two or three of its citizens that has already found its way into court circles and bids fair to remain there until officially settled at the September term of common pleas court.

Dan Lloyd, telegraph operator for the A. C. and Y. at Litchfield was held before Justice of Peace Ainsworth Monday on a warrant sworn to by Mrs. Blanche Preston, in which the latter claimed she had reason to believe she was in danger of personal violence from Lloyd, and praying that Lloyd be placed under bond to keep the peace.

According to testimony given by Mrs. Preston at the hearing, Lloyd circulated a story to the effect that Mrs. Preston, while quarreling with her husband, had approached the latter with a butcher knife. That later when she took Lloyd to task for the alleged statement, he is said to have become violently angered and told the Preston woman that what he said was none of her business, coupling the declaration with a threat of bodily injury.

Justice of Peace Ainsworth placed Lloyd under a bond of \$1,000, signed by J. H. Best of Litchfield, for his appearance in court when called and for his preservation of public peace in the interim.

#### AKRON-MEDINA ROAD SOON TO BE COMPLETED

Contract Awarded for Strip Near Village.

Bids for the construction of the 1700 foot strip of road from the corporate limits of the village east on East Washington street were opened by the County Commissioners Monday forenoon. There were three bidders—the Meller-Weidner Co., the Clement Co. and Harry Strosbeck, the respective amounts being as follows: Meller-Weidner Co., \$9,944.79; Clement Co., \$10,855.55; Strosbeck, \$11,529.14. The Meller-Weidner Co. was awarded the contract not only because they were the lowest bidder, but also because they were the only ones who submitted a bid for the road bonds, amounting to \$7,678.14, the bid being for per cent accrued interest.

Following the awarding of the contract, Mr. Meller stated that the strip will be completed within the next week. His company had just completed the Akron-Medina road from the county line west to the beginning of the 1700 foot strip, and with the completion of the latter strip there will be practically a continuous improved road from Medina to Akron. A very short strip at present unimproved in Summit county, will be completed within the next few weeks, the Summit county Commissioners having recently awarded a contract for this work.

#### VAGRANT SAYS HE WAS GOSPEL MINISTER

George Hawley, whose home is where he takes his hat off, arrested in Litchfield a few weeks ago for drunkenness and fined \$5 and costs for the offense, is in jail again.

In the first case he was paroled after being imprisoned for a couple of days and appeared very gracious for the dispensation.

One day last week Sheriff Bigelow was notified that a stranger was taking lodging in a barn at Rieley. After hunting for some little time the sheriff finally pulled a fellow out from under several feet of hay, whom he recognized as Hawley. The latter had several packages of cigarettes in his pockets from which he had been smoking freely, as attested by the many butts and burnt matches scattered about the barn.

Saturday morning Hawley was arraigned before Justice of Peace Ainsworth on a charge of vagrancy and fined \$25 and costs.

Hawley is about 45 years of age, of fairly good appearance, and stated to Sheriff Bigelow that as a former Methodist minister he had preached the gospel for six years. Sheriff Bigelow places little credit to the statement, however, owing to Hawley's failure, or least disinclination, to throw any further light on his spiritual activities. That Hawley was drunk when arrested the first time however, may be safely taken as an indication that he had been "laboring in the vineyard," tho not the Lord's.

#### RUMORED SALE OF LAKE RESORT

Cleveland Capital Said to Have Covetous Eye on Property.

#### RADICAL CHANGES ON GROUNDS PROPOSED

Present Owners Believed Agreeable to Sale if Money Offered is of Right Size.

If plans which are now and have been in the making for some time do not go awry, it is possible that changes of almost a revolutionary character will take place at Chippewa Lake park, not only as to buildings and their arrangements, but also as to the lake itself and grounds.

At the present time, as is commonly known, the lake and grounds belong to the Community club, which also owns and controls the upper grounds which contain many cottages and a hotel, but on the lower park and lake A. M. Beach, manager, holds a twenty-five year lease, taken only two or three years ago when the Community club came into control of the property.

That there is to be a radical change seems likely from the known fact that several prominent Cleveland men of wealth have been desirous for some time of organizing a stock company with this end in view, and from the rumored report that the Community club, for reasons all its own, would welcome some such proposition that carried with it the right-sized pecuniary consideration. It is also understood that Manager Beach is friendly to the idea and is suffering no sleepless nights as to his twenty-five year franchise.

The Sentinel has received information from what it regards as a reliable source that a meeting is to be held within the next two or three days at the Community club grounds by parties from both sides to the proposition who will be empowered to close the deal if satisfactory arrangements can be made.

In this event it is stated that the new company will be formed at the earliest possible date, and changes on the grounds begun at once. Of these it is contemplated to add a 60-foot extension to the present dance pavilion, remodeling the basement for a dining hall; the present dining hall in the hotel will be converted into bedrooms, and a large sun room added to the building. It is also the purpose to erect a 50x50 ft. bath house with all modern conveniences.

While it seems to be the present plan to enlarge the dance pavilion and combine with it the dining hall, there is a possibility, we are informed, that instead of doing so it may later be deemed advisable to erect a completely new dance and dining building. If so, it will be located on the beach as close to the water as possible, the dimensions being 75 x 150 feet.

#### DISPUTED BALLOTS DECLARED INVALID

Not satisfied with the first decision of Secretary of State Smith that the majority vote in Wadsworth at the recent primary election must stand as shown by the returns made by the election clerks, which gave J. C. Whitlam a victory over the present incumbent, F. W. Boyer, by one vote, four disputed ballots were subsequently sent to the state department for a ruling as to their validity. The name of Boyer appeared on each of these four ballots, altho the X accompanying the names were inscribed in the wrong place. Boyer and his friends contended that the intent of the voters of these ballots was indicated by their having written his name on them, and their being counted would throw to him the nomination. Secretary of State Smith ruled that the ballots were invalid and most not be counted at all. Thus, it appears that Whitlam is the Republican nominee for the office, tho successful by one vote.

#### TYPHOID STARTS

The County Health Department reports about ten cases of typhoid fever in the townships of Chatham, Westfield, Harrisville and Medina. Samples of the water supply from several homes in some of these townships have been sent to Columbus for analysis, and in nearly every case showed typhoid bacteria.

#### UNDER INDICTMENT IN AKRON AND MEDINA

Willis Canaan, Akron stock broker, under indictment in the Medina courts for alleged illegal sale of stock to Isaac Betz, of Spencer, who died a few months ago, and who was released under a bond of \$1,000, is in similar trouble in Akron, where he was secretly indicted by the July grand jury.

Canaan is accused of defrauding Mrs. Charles Davidson of Akron in the sale of 18 shares of Test Restaurant Co. stock which she alleges he did not possess, according to the indictment. She paid him \$500 in April, the indictment charges, and received only a receipt for the money.

Canaan was arrested by Akron authorities in Jackson, Mich., where he had an office, last Friday.

Following his arraignment on charges preferred by the Summit county authorities, Canaan was ordered to report to the Medina common pleas court at once to answer charges here, Saturday morning, in company with E. L. Baumgardner of Akron, Canaan surrendered himself to the local court.

At the time set for his hearing here following his indictment, Canaan failed to appear and a capias was issued by Judge N. H. McClure, but Canaan's bond of \$1,000, signed by F. O. Phillips, was never declared forfeit. When Canaan appeared here Saturday morning Mr. Phillips asked that he be released from the bond, which was done later, however, Mr. Phillips, with Mr. Baumgardner, became surety for a new bond for Canaan in the sum of \$1,000, and Canaan was again given his liberty. Canaan's explanation for his non-appearance here for his hearing, was that he received no notice.

The case against Canaan in the Medina courts is scheduled for trial at the September term. The case presents a peculiar situation because of the death of the plaintiff.

#### EXPENSIVE CIGARETTES

John Pochmara, Lodi grocer, arrested by Sheriff Bigelow last week Monday for alleged selling of cigarettes without a license, plead guilty before Justice of Peace C. E. Knapp of Lodi on Friday and was assessed a fine of \$200 and the costs.

#### DAIRYMEN MAKE TOUR OF COUNTY

Visit Many Pure Bred Herds And Gain Valuable Information.

#### DEMONSTRATION IN JUDGING, A FEATURE

Visitors Are Convinced of Importance of Building Up Good Producing Herds.

Possibilities of building up good producing herds, and also the advantages accruing from the cow testing, were pointed out to the 150 or more dairymen who made the tour of eastern Medina county August 23. The automobile tour had been planned by D. E. Scisinger, tester for association No. 2, and while most of the tourists were members of one of the cow testing associations, all farmers of the county were invited, and many of them took advantage of the opportunity to view some of the best dairy blood that Medina can boast of.

Starting at 9:30 at Grant Childsey's at Brunswick, the party was shown one of the greatest Jersey herds in the country, and the herd sires used there have been rated among the foremost in Ohio. Mr. Childsey told of his breeding plans for the past several years whereby he had used three sires, of Hood Farm breeding principally, and thereby he had improved

Rudy, Supervisor, Kalamazoo State Normal College, Michigan, will be the regular instructors. Mr. Reigel will talk largely on curriculum and adaptation of the school program to the community needs. Miss Rudy will give instruction in methods, particularly in reading, language and grammar. The music will be in charge of Samuel T. Burns, the new county supervisor of music. He has an interesting program for the week and will be assisted by John Beck, who is to supervise the music in Medina schools and by Van Dora McKee, who is to work in some of the Medina county schools.

Besides the regular lectures part time instructors will be present during the week. Edith McClure Patterson, who was to have been present at the educational rally last February has promised to come at this time. Nellie I. Sharp of New York City will deal with music appreciation. C. L. Flatter of Yellow Springs, O., has charge of the moral part of the program and will talk on present day problems as they confront the teacher.

The officers of the institute are F. D. Riffey, Seville, president; and Hazel Clark, Medina, secretary and treasurer.

No Medina county teacher can afford to miss the institute. It will be full of suggestions and helps for the coming year. Every teacher should be present unless a valid excuse can be given for non-attendance.
