

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BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Village of Medina, State of Ohio, (three-fourths of all members elected or appointed there-to concurring.)

SEC. I.—That Section 1 of an Ordinance passed by the Village Council, December 22, 1920 and titled "An Ordinance Fixing the compensation and bond of municipal officers" be amended so as to read as follows, viz: Section 1, The Mayor in addition to fees allowed by statute and ordinance shall receive a salary of \$300.00 Three Hundred and no/100 Dollars per annum, payable quarterly out of the Corporation Treasury, and shall give bond with approved sureties in the sum of \$1000.00.

SEC. II.—That Section 1 of said Ordinance passed December 22, 1920 be and is hereby repealed.

SEC. III.—That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
